## **FROM THE MINISTER'S ROLLTOP:**

### ***What I did on my Summer Vacation (and study leave)***

Heretofore, my work week has averaged 80% of a full-time position. Effective July 1 of this year, I am under contract as Summit Fellowship's full-time settled minister. I am grateful to the members and friends of Summit for the outpouring of support that has made it possible for me to turn my full attention to ministry.

This change means that upon my return from two weeks of vacation and two weeks of study leave in July, my office hours and visitation activities will be increasing. Stay tuned to Summit's e-news for more information. (By the way, my contract stipulates that I am given a total of four weeks of vacation and four weeks of study leave per year. Anyone interested in the terms of my contract as settled minister can simply make an appointment with Linda Peck, Office Administrator, and she will provide a copy for your review.)

Four days of my vacation were spent with Pilar and our nieces volunteering at *Best Friends Animal Society*, in Kanab Utah. There we cared for dogs and cats who are undergoing treatment and rehabilitation until they can be adopted out to good homes. *Best Friends*—the largest no-kill animal sanctuary in the country—is one of my favorite places to spend vacation time. The rest of my vacation was given to listening to music, learning some new word games, playing chess, following the news, walking Zeke and Millie, cleaning house, and enjoying my favorite sporting event: *Le Tour de France*.

A minister's study leave is frequently spent reading, reflecting and planning for the coming year's services and reflection/sermon topics. In addition to this activity, I had originally planned to attend a four-day continuing education event only to discover that my application for attendance was rejected because the course had been filled to capacity. This disappointment turned out to be a good thing, as during the second week of July the hard drive on my antique computer (vintage 2004) finally crashed and I had to research, purchase, and install software in a new machine.

Four books in particular have been the focus of my studying leave: 1) *Saving Paradise: How Christianity Traded Love of this World for Crucifixion and Empire*, by Rita Nakashima Brock and Rebecca Ann Parker (President of Starr King School for the Ministry), 2) *The Righteous Mind: Why Good People are Divided by Politics and Religion*, by Jonathan Haidt (pronounced "Height"), 3) *Trancework* (Fourth Edition), by Michael Yapko, and 4) *Growing A Beloved Community: Twelve Hallmarks of a Healthy Congregation*, by my mentor and our beloved Summitterian, Thomas Owen-Towle. I am also spending some time at the SDSU Library doing further study on the history and philosophy of the doctrine of Political Realism and plan to do 6 hours of online Continuing Education before I return to the office on Sunday, July 29th. I also just purchased and will soon be reading an historical work entitled *El Cinco de Mayo: An American Tradition*, by David E. Hayes-Bautista.

I predict this new fiscal year will be a busy and engaging one for all of us, spiritually, communally, and politically—and I'm looking forward to sharing it with you! Thanks to all of you who are helping to build Beloved Community at Summit. And thanks ahead of time to all who will be stepping up to take a more active role in the leadership and development of our fellowship, our Unitarian Universalist Association, and our collective public witness.

## FROM OUR SUMMIT LEADERSHIP

### *From the President*

#### **The Mockingbird War**

A mockingbird has been stealing my tomatoes. It has gotten at least three so far and it has prompted me to ponder different plans to stop him. I do not want to lose ANY tomatoes.

It was a great surprise when Debbie, by chance, discovered that a bird was the responsible party. We naturally thought that it must be a raccoon, or a rabbit, or a lowly rat. Instead it was an animal that pretends to provide pleasurable song, while plotting how he will get to my tomatoes.

Our cat has been no help at all. She simply lies in our mint, crushing the leaves, and gazing, with great disinterest, while this large bird flutters to my only tomato plant. I need to make plans.

One of the topics for the August 5th Town Hall meeting will be the Board's decision to NOT conduct a capital campaign in 2013 for the purpose of retiring the mortgage. There were a variety of reasons. One of these could be called a cost benefit analysis.

To begin with, seen in perspective of other congregations, our mortgage payments are not an excessive part of our budget. We were told that the UUA has a guideline that mortgage payments should not be more than 25% of the annual budget. Ours is less than 10% if you count only debt service (interest payments). It is only about 14% if you include payments on principle.

Second, the benefit would be relatively small, and could affect annual giving. No one is asked to give to a capital campaign, if this means they will reduce their annual pledge. Even so, there is always the fear that annual pledging will go down. For every \$100,000 that we might collect in a capital campaign, we would free up only about \$8,500 from our annual budget. This is about 4% of our annual pledges.

Third, there may be other creative ways for retiring the mortgage. These could include charitable remainder trusts or self-directed IRA loans from members of the congregation.

Finally, there may be a future need for a capital campaign that exceeds any present urgency.

I have discussed the mockingbird problem with Debbie. I have come up with several proposals. We could buy a mechanical owl, operated on batteries. We would probably need two, one on each side of the tomato plant. We could build a huge cage to cover the entire plant. I suggested that we buy one of those high-powered water pistols. Debbie could sit out on our back deck, perhaps for hours, waiting for the mockingbird. Hopefully, it wouldn't be one of those really hot days.

I finally calmed down. These were, after all, only three small tomatoes. I could probably buy at least 10 pounds of tomatoes for the cost of any one of my schemes. I guess I will stop by the Farmers Market, if I get around to it. I could even pick up some flowers for Debbie.

“Immigration as a Moral Issue” is the Unitarian Universalist Association's Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) for the years 2010-2014. Congregations have been using a wide range of UUA and local resources to learn more about this complex issue.

Summit recently sponsored a UUA six week introductory curriculum (led by Mar Cardenas). Section 1 gave a broad based overview. Extraordinary, excellent!

The UUA has suggested books, films, local contacts, Religious Education materials and service elements that we can use to explore this study action. One video was shown by the Social Action Committee recently.

Summit is also part of Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry California, which is emphasizing Immigration as its main action interest this year. The UULMCA works to support laws and encourage legislators to bring justice to our legal system. Linda Ullrich is our representative.

At Justice General Assembly this past June in Phoenix, those of us who were there from Summit became aware of the horrendous injustice toward immigrants. We heard personal stories of disgraceful conditions in the "jails" and inhumane treatment at the hands of Arizona authorities. We shared with you some of what we learned at a Circle Discussion a few weeks ago.

There are many opportunities to get involved and take action locally and with the UUA.

NOTICE: Summit Library will soon have a section on Immigration with books on loan and resources (websites and contacts, etc.) We can join the efforts of groups active here in Southern California and especially San Diego. Also, we hope to show a couple of videos just recently released about local border issues and detention facilities.

## **RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION FOR ALL**

### **Children's Religious Exploration News**

The summer is half over and fall planning has begun. In July, the Children's Religious Exploration Committee held its annual retreat to plan the 2012-13 "Sunday School" year. Parents, teachers and anyone interested in programming for children and youth were invited. Ten participated including Elinor Weed (CRE Committee Chair), 6 parents and 2 youth advisers, as well as myself, Director of CRE. We

discussed curriculum, teacher training, parent participation, youth group activities and intergenerational events. We have five great new curriculums with lots of fun ideas. Here is what we will be doing:

- **Pre-kindergarten to First Grade: Spirit Play**

*Spirit Play* is a UU, Montessori method-based program that encourages children to question and wonder about their spiritual home and beliefs. Class starts with a story told using a story box with felt pieces, figures and objects that bring the tale to life. Then the children are asked “wondering” questions to inspire them to think about what they’ve heard and to respond from the heart. They can then explore the story using art materials and the story boxes from previous weeks. They will be able to work on projects, independently choosing from available materials. This is a child-centered spiritual approach that can be very rewarding for both the child and adult leaders. Find out more at: [www.spiritplay.net](http://www.spiritplay.net)

- **Second & Third Grade: Moral Tales**

*Moral Tales* is a *Tapestry of Faith* curriculum that provides spiritual and ethical tools to make choices and take actions that reflect our Unitarian Universalist beliefs and values. Every two weeks they will explore a moral tale from a different culture. Stories are told using a “story basket” with touchable objects that help the tale come to life. These teaching stories are then reflected through art, play, action and creative interaction. - **Fourth & Fifth Grade: Tool Box of Faith**

*Tool Box of Faith* is a *Tapestry of Faith* curriculum that invites participants to reflect on qualities of our UU faith, such as integrity, courage and love, as tools they can use in living their lives and building their own faith. Every two weeks we will explore one of the 16 sessions. Each session uses a tool as a metaphor for an important quality of our faith such as reflection (symbolized by a mirror), flexibility (duct tape), and justice (a flashlight). Over the year students will collect these “tools” in their spiritual tool box. - **Middle School – Building Bridges**

*Building Bridges* is a new World Religions program from *Tapestry of Faith* that works to deepen youth's understanding of the dynamic, fascinating, and varied world in which they live. It seeks to broaden their knowledge of humanity and embolden their spiritual search, while providing an opportunity to learn about a different faith and faith community. A unit will involve a four week cycle: week 1 – learn about the faith; week 2 – have a visitor from that faith community come to talk to us; week 3 – visit the faith community; week 4 – talk about what we have learned. - **High School Youth Group - YRUU**

Based on youth feedback last spring the Youth Group will follow a rotating schedule to include working with the Social Action Committee, Popcorn Theology (movie clips and discussion), UUA curriculum program and a monthly "Rap Sunday" to just talk about current issues. **Rev. Frank Invites You to Read and Discuss a Book:**

I have been encouraging people to read a recent work by moral psychologist Jonathan Haidt, entitled *The Righteous Mind: Why Good People Are Divided by Politics and Religion* (2012). If you are interested in how and why Liberals and Conservatives think differently, and up-to-date research that challenges us to communicate more effectively with those who live on a different part of the religious and political spectrum from us, then I recommend it. I will be leading some discussion classes on this book in the fall, and would like to encourage anyone who is interested in participating to read and become familiar with Haidt's research and his interpretations of the question represented in the book's title.

*Warning:* While this book has definite implications for how we live out our UU Principles and Purposes, it will probably not be of much interest to anyone but those who like to think about and discuss some of the more profound questions about religion, psychology and philosophy about human nature, community and spirituality.

While you are at it, go to [yourmorals.org](http://yourmorals.org), and have fun responding to some or all of the many questionnaires. Haidt and colleagues have been using this website to do research and to help people see where they fall on the liberal-conservative spectrum, as he defines it.

Haidt's book is available on Amazon, in both Kindle and book format.
