Message from the President

Lately, I have been thinking about my "comfort zone." Mostly, I've been thinking about how it's been under attack over the last 8 years and how much trouble I've had trying to defend its boundaries.

It started when my wife, Debbie, persuaded me that we should start attending a Unitarian Fellowship on Sunday. There was very little ritual, they didn't say God, and I didn't know any of the songs. Even if the tunes were familiar, the words were always fiddled with.

I knew the Catholic songs and singing was the only thing that got me to go to service on Sundays. It certainly wasn't to hear the homily.

Next, I was asked to become a member. I don't like joining. How could I explain it to my Catholic family, especially my mother? I had to come up with an elevator speech. It still isn't very good.

Then I was asked to pledge an annual contribution. I had not even done this when I was a Catholic. I avoid pledges, whether they be loyalty, allegiance, or monetary. I did pledge *something* when I got married. We wrote our own vows. I tried to keep mine simple.

Then I was asked to be on a committee. I was 55 years old and could probably announce that I had never served on even one committee. The word "committee" is definitely outside of my comfort zone. It meant working with other people and learning to stay polite while they express their ideas and opinions. I'm not

sure I always succeeded. If I did, I was afraid I would no longer fit in with my siblings during family reunions.

Finally, I was asked to be President of the Board of Directors. I last ran for elected office in the 8th grade, when I was elected Vice President of the Civics Club. Last year they asked me if they could nominate me for President of the Board. I was disappointed to learn that I would be running, unopposed.

In reviewing all of the activities, which members and friends of this congregation participate in, I have come to the conclusion that Unitarian Universalists, though respecting every person's dignity, are not very respectful of comfort zones. Perhaps we should be warning perspective members. How much do you value your comfort zone? Are you prepared to defend its borders, from attacks, both within and without?

Children's Religious Exploration News

January was a month of reconnection for me. My son, Sean, was home from San Jose State. It was wonderful to have him be part of our household again. Adding someone "new" to the household rhythm always requires adjustments.

First you need to get ready: We had to clean out his room before he arrived as it had become a catch all for other people's stuff while he was gone. Shopping had to be done to stock up on his favorite foods. We cleared our schedule so that there would be "family time" while he was home. Then you "entertain" your guest: While Sean was in town both Grandma's made time to visit. We had family movie and game nights. I made all of his favorite home cooked meals. A guest brings gifts as well: There was another driving adult to help with after-school pick-up. Both Anya and Colin had someone to go to with their computer issues who could actually understand and help them. Paul and I could go out in the evening together without worry. Then your guest departs: The room is empty and you feel a piece of the puzzle is missing. Life goes back to normal. Warm memories fill your heart.

In the Children's Religious Exploration program we are preparing for our guests from the Interfaith Shelter. The rooms have been "renovated" and readied for conversion to guest quarters. The Interfaith Shelter Committee is planning, "Promming" and preparing. Now our children are getting ready, too.

I've talked to Summit's children and youth about the Shelter. They are getting ready for our guests by learning about homelessness. This is different for various ages:

Our 1st & 2nd grade class learned the story of Ruth, who upon the death of her husband, returned to the land of her people. She knew no one and worked gleaning grain from harvested fields for food. Through hard work and help from new friends she found her home.

Our 3rd-5th graders learned about homeless animals. They read a story of a homeless dog that went to a "people shelter" and was adopted by a shelter worker. They held a popcorn fundraiser to collect funds to make gifts for our shelter guests.

Both Middle and High School youth have talked about the Interfaith Shelter. The Middle School is learning about our UU values and how we live them through our actions. The High School Youth talked in depth about what it means to be homeless and how they can support the Interfaith Shelter here at Summit.

All of our classes are to making a fleece blanket for each person who will be staying at Summit. The children will help fringe the fabric and tie knots to make them snuggly. The funds to purchase the fabric were raised by the 3rd-5th grade popcorn sale. Thanks to all who purchased popcorn to support this project! Although they will not get to meet our guests, our children can imagine what it would be like to wrap a warm blanket of caring around them. When our guests depart they will be leaving behind a lesson in love for our children. Summit has heart!

Social Action Corner - *Service Is Our Prayer*

Helping Others in East County and Beyond

Summitarians helping out in East County:

Peanut Butter and Jelly: For January's Social Action Collection we gathered a HUGE pile of peanut butter, jelly and honey jars, and many loaves of bread. These staples were taken to Crisis House and will provide many low cost, nutritious meals for families and individuals in need.

A reminder- food collection basket: Crisis House is in need of food pantry donations, which have decreased in recent years even as the need has increased. Please remember that a basket is always present in Summit's greeting room to receive your canned and boxed food items- why not pick up one or two extra items this week while doing your grocery shopping, and drop them in the basket on Sunday?

Summitarians helping out in the Wider Community:

Shoes for Children in Mexico: The collection of used shoes for impoverished children in Rosarito, Mexico has been completed. Kay Anderson will transport the shoes and arrange distribution.

Kiva: Over the past four years we have used your donations (from two past collections) to make microloans to women around the world through Kiva, the world's first online lending platform connecting online lenders to entrepreneurs. We currently have 23 microloans out in 22 countries, totaling \$1200. We have had six loans paid back to date, with no defaults, and as money is repaid it is used to make new loans.

How Can You Help Summit's Social Action Efforts?

Immigration: February's Social Action Sunday will focus on immigration issues, particularly of undocumented immigrants. Information will be available- find out how you can get informed and get involved. "Immigration as a Moral Issue" was selected at the 2010 General Assembly to be the 2010-2014 Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations.

Environmental: It is no longer allowable to dispose of your used household batteries in the trash- so rather than letting them accumulate in your garage, now you can bring them to Summit and we'll dispose of them for you. Look for the collection basket in the greeting room.

Financial: Fair Trade Coffee and Chocolate – February 19: Put Your Money Toward A Great Cause – Purchase Fair Trade coffee and chocolate! You can also place a special order to make sure you never have to go without. Summit's teens are now running this program- if you have any questions, please contact Gary Baldwin.
