January 1: *"Conjuring Peace"* Following his participation with other members and friends in Summit's 24-Hour Meditation Vigil for Peace in 2012, Rev. Frank will offer some ideas about how each of us can continue to conjure peace and contribute to making it more of a reality in our lives and in this world we share.

January 8: *"When Push Comes to Shove"* Conflict is inevitable. Conflict is often painful. Conflict is an essential part of the kinds of changes and growth life demands. Rev. Frank will invite us to reflect upon these and other truths, and provide us with some practical, spiritually-grounded methods for responding to and managing conflict in our homes and communities.

January 15: *"Where Do We Go From Here?"* This question was raised by Martin Luther King Jr. in a 1967 book, in which he encouraged humanity to move away from violent "co-annihilation" before it was "too late," and toward a community in which diverse peoples could live full and healthy lives as brothers and sisters in our one human family. Our reflection together will draw upon King's legacy and focus on living the good life from this time forward.

January 22: *"The Way(s) to Salvation"* Rev. Frank will challenge us to consider that we all need to be saved from something...for something... But just what is "salvation" anyway? Is it something that comes by believing a formula? Is it something that comes by doing nice things for others? Does it require us to reject or condemn people who don't agree with us? Is it something that comes by conforming to a certain set of traditions, social customs, or community values? Come see...and be saved!

January 29: *"Auction Surprise!"* In his first official act as Summit's new Affiliate Community Minister (approved by action of the Board of Directors on 12/15/2011), the Rev. Don Stouder will preach on a topic requested by member Vic White, a right which Vic purchased at last November's Summit Auction. Can Don be stumped? How will he pull it off? The only way to find out is to show up and decide for yourself! (And while you are at it, give him a warm, personal welcome to his new role in our Summit Community.)

FROM THE MINISTER'S ROLLTOP:

"Some Foundations We've Laid in 2011"

To rip off some Milton, "How soon hath time, that subtle thief...stol'n on his wing" the year 2011! So much has happened!

In 2011 the fellowship realized some important accomplishments, including:

► the establishment of our Peace Pole,

- ▶ generous financial giving by our members and friends that has kept us financially strong through the year,
- ▶ the approval of a week-long trial as a host congregation for the Interfaith Shelter Network,
- ▶ the addition of twenty new members,
- ▶ the establishment of a new Committee on Ministry and Committee on Communications and Public Outreach,
- ▶ an exploding Religious Exploration program under the generous and capable leadership of our RE Director Mary Carter Vail and a dedicated group of parents, teachers and RE Committee Members,
- ▶ the formation of a UU Legislative Committee under the leadership of Linda Ullrich, working under the auspices of our wonderful Social Action Committee,
- ▶ multiple educational and special worship service offerings by and for adult lay members, with a strong focus on anti-racism and multiculturalism,
- ▶ the reception and the raising of \$32,275.00 in preliminary commitments toward the proposed Walden 2012 project (which will be voted upon by the congregation this month),
- ▶ a recent gift from the estate of Joan and Phil Chan in the amount of \$9,000 for the building of a pulpit and greeting room host table specially customized for Summit.

I was also pleased recently to receive an affirming response to my first year's ministry evaluation from the Unitarian Universalist Association's Ministerial Fellowship Committee. The Committee wrote:

“Congratulations on a strong and vital first year of ministry. You are doing an excellent job and are obviously appreciated by the congregation. Not only are your ministerial skills exemplary, but your appreciation of the need for self-care is exemplary as well...Best wishes in your commitment to delegation and support of the structures that will strengthen your congregation. Keep up the good work.”

As we look ahead to an exciting New Year, I am most thankful for all of you who continue to make our fellowship's work and witness vital and visible in East County. I will also be remembering those who have been so much a part of us and have passed from our sight—through death or because of a move to other places. Among them are our dear Summit family members Guenter Esslinger, Lois Davies, and the late Bill Nutter. We miss them and will continue to acknowledge them for all the ways in which they helped make Summit a strong and compassionate community.

FROM OUR SUMMIT LEADERSHIP

Message from the President

Dear Friends,

Debbie and I just refinanced our house. We took advantage of the lower interest rates and are saving on our monthly payment. We purchased our house in April 1985. The mortgage is now scheduled to be paid off in 2042, about six months before Debbie's 90th birthday.

The Summit mortgage is quite a different thing. First, the fellowship doesn't pay income tax, so there is no advantage to having an interest deduction. Second, our mortgage is with the prior owner, because commercial banks are reluctant to lend to religious organizations and will only do so at extraordinarily high rates. Third, even with the prior owner, we are paying an interest rate, which is now costing us almost \$24,000 per year, not including payments on principal.

Finally, though we are making payments on the principal, we are currently able to balance our budget only by deferring \$5,400 in principal payments, for the next three years. It will then be due in a lump sum, totaling more than \$16,000.

There are a lot of good reasons for Summit to have a mortgage burning party. It would free up more than \$30,000 per year. We currently have a minister at 80% and we don't provide the recommended 10% retirement contribution for all employees. We could be a greater force in our community.

On January 8th there will be a congregational meeting at which it will be proposed that we invite Larry Wheeler, our consultant for our initial successful Capital Campaign, to come to Summit to hold a workshop/feasibility study on the proposal to conduct a Capital Campaign to retire the mortgage. The cost is \$1,000 and would be paid from the remaining capital reserves from our initial Capital Campaign. Larry Wheeler would come out in the spring of 2012 and the new campaign would begin in 2013. Believe it or not, this would be five years after the end of our initial Capital Campaign.

By the way, hold the date. You are all invited to our house in February 2042 for our mortgage burning party.

Summit 2011

From where I sit I see a positive energy moving Summit along briskly these days. We've been growing! I've been scheduling committee meetings all over our campus and events are popping up on a regular basis. People in the neighborhood stop by the office during the week to see what we are about. One day in November a young couple and their toddler stopped by because they saw our Peace Pole.

Reading over Summit's current financial reports made me curious as to where we were at the end of 2002, the year I came on board. The following are some stats that jumped out at me:

That year Summit's total liabilities and equity came to \$267,935.⁰⁰, income was \$130,333.⁰⁰, and expenses were \$145,413.⁰⁰.

Today our fixed assets are \$1,512,530.⁰⁰. When we bought our facility 5.5 years ago, the mortgage amount was \$1,300,000.⁰⁰. Currently we owe \$395,237.⁰⁰!

We are nearly half way through 2011-12 FY. At the end of November, income was \$116,835.⁰⁰, \$18K of that was from the auction (by the end of Nov.), and expenses were \$92,021.⁰⁰. But don't get excited or casual about making your pledges! We need to remember the day to day realities, too. Things break, we'll need a new roof in a few short years, etc.

As I see it, Summit is a vibrant, welcoming, homey community, whose leadership has laid solid plans for the future, however small in the beginning. And 23 years later, Summitarians are still standing hand-in-hand looking forward.

Children's Religious Exploration News

Happy New Year! In my childhood in Maine, January was a time of quiet reflection and anticipation. The seed catalogs would arrive and my Mom and I would pour over the pictures and map out our garden on graph paper. I could not wait for the ground to thaw and the planting to start. It was a long wait as planting would not start until late April after "mud season". Here in California, I can garden all year long. What I plant is determined by the seasonal temperatures. January is time for cold crops like peas, spinach and lettuces. It is time to plant for spring harvest.

We have a seasonal cycle in our Children's program as well. In the fall we start our new curriculums. The teachers, children and youth get to know each other, create their class covenants, and settle into their new programs. It is our "planting time". We then take a break from the lessons to work together on our Children's Holiday Service and to celebrate the Holiday festivals in class. This gives our seeds time to germinate. Now it is time to get back to learning and living our UU Principals during our time together each Sunday morning. Our seeds have sprouted into lovely young plants and need our care to help them to thrive.

Our volunteer Religious Exploration Teachers, Advisers and Assistants nurture and care for our children and youth each Sunday at Summit. On January 12 we will have a Teaching Teams Planning Meeting. This is an important time for our teaching teams to gather and talk about what is working and what may need adjusting in their groups. Together they will look at upcoming lessons and create our spring teaching schedule. This is also their opportunity to make suggestions and adjustments to the curriculums or class routine as a group. Dinner will be served – I plan to make some yummy soup, salad and fresh baked bread.

This spring we are planning Coming of Age for our 9th and 10th grade youth. This is an important "rite of passage" for UU youth on the road to adulthood. I am modeling our program after the one used by Liz Jones at FUUSD. As part of Coming of Age, each youth will be partnered with a Mentor to work with them. They will meet together several times as the youth work to discover what they believe and how they

fit into the adult world. I am looking for Mentors. Please let me know if you are willing to be part of this rewarding experience.

Our Children's Program is growing. We have several new families who are attending each week consistently. The children are enjoying the activities and the friendships that have developed with each other. We have room for more! Do you know any families who are looking for a spiritual home for their children? Invite them to visit Summit.

If you joined us for our Children's Holiday Service, you know what an amazing group of young people come to Summit. I invite you to get to know them better by participating in some of our programs. There are many ways to get involved. Let me know that you want to be part of the fun and we can talk about what works for you. The seeds are planted – together we watch them grow!
