## FROM THE MINISTER'S ROLLTOP:

### **“Practicing our 5<sup>th</sup> Principle: Furthering Democracy at Summit”**

As a Unitarian Universalist congregation we have promised to work together to practice our UU Principles and Purposes. They can be found at <http://www.uua.org/beliefs/principles/>.

Our 5<sup>th</sup> principle encourages us to affirm and promote “The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.”

At its annual Board Retreat, the very first goal set for this fiscal year (July 1-June 30, 2013) was to “Develop and refine democratic processes and procedures.” Many people have been working behind the scenes to help our community fulfill this goal.

- ◆ The Visioning Task Force helped us gather input from the members and friends of our congregation via the Vision Tree in our Salon and focus groups in which every member of our congregation was invited to participate.
- ◆ The Committee on Ministry has been developing new ways to keep in touch with the feelings, needs and wishes of the congregation, and has provided trainings and proposed guidelines for how we can address problems and conflicts in our congregation more effectively.
- ◆ The Committee on Nominations, responsible for submitting a slate of proposed Officers and Board members at our Annual Meeting, has refined and established its policies and procedures.
- ◆ The Strategic Planning Committee has strongly encouraged Summit Committees and Groups at Summit to draft their own mission statements in alignment with the overall mission of our Fellowship, which is “In spiritual community, we are committed to building a compassionate, just and sustainable world.”
- ◆ The Board of Directors has set policy for when and how nominations for officers and board members will be invited from the congregation.
- ◆ The minister and leaders have met with members and groups of the fellowship, and created opportunities on Sunday mornings, which have been designed to elicit input about how we are doing as a Congregation....

And, doubtless, there is more to be done as we seek to practice our 5<sup>th</sup> principle ever more faithfully.

At our last Summit Board meeting, Vice President Jennifer Gorman presented to the Directors a detailed summary of her findings regarding possible deficiencies in our current voting and election procedures. It remains to be seen whether her parliamentary audit may eventually lead us as a congregation to consider some changes in our bylaws. Thank you Jennifer!!!

As your minister, I would recommend such changes. As I see it, you and I have a moral and spiritual obligation to ensure, inasmuch as possible, that all matters requiring the deliberations and actions of our membership may be given fair hearing, and the voices and interests of each member be given an appropriate and uniformly available forum for expression and consideration.

The achievement of such lofty objectives may seem daunting. Thankfully, we do not have to reinvent the wheel. There are parliamentary rules and procedures that have been around, and evolving for over 130 years that can readily inform how we can best practice democratic principles when voting in assembly on important matters. These rules and procedures can be found in a manual based upon research done by a U.S. citizen named Henry Martyn Robert. In 1876, after a disastrous experience of trying to run a public meeting at his church, Robert wrote his "Pocket Manual for Rules of Order in Deliberative Assemblies," Now known simply as *Robert's Rules of Order*, these rules and procedures for democratic deliberation by groups and organizations are customarily applied in our UU congregations.

Living and working together democratically can be challenging and difficult at times. In personal relationships, small groups and committees, we are learning to work more collaboratively and how to resolve problems and transform conflicts for more positive and productive outcomes. In coming days, it will also be important for us to become more familiar with, and put into practice, rules and proceedings that will help us more effectively and efficiently manage meetings in which important decisions are being made.

## RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION FOR ALL

### **Children's Religious Exploration News**

The first three months of 2013 have been very busy with lots of exciting activity at Summit. Here is a sampling of what has been going on in our Religious Exploration program:

The Nursery re-opened at the end of 2012. Cathy Young, our lead Nursery teacher, works with a volunteer each week to provide a safe, nurturing environment for our youngest children.

Currently we have two children regularly attending each week. With new families discovering us each week, we hope to have increased weekly attendance soon.

Story boxes are filling the shelves in our Spirit Play class. This Montessori based program uses felt, images and objects to share stories. Each story has a box and, after it is shared with the class, is available for individuals in the class to work with. This spring we are sharing stories that illustrate our seven promises (principles). Some of our new stories have included classics like Stone Soup, the Empty Pot, and the Weight of a Snowflake. Spirit Play creates a child focused place where our pre-school through first grade can explore spiritual issues through stories, art and play.

In our second to third grade class we continue to work with teaching stories from around the world in Moral Tales. We heard the story of the Good Samaritan as part of the "Do Unto Others" unit. By role playing, we used this tale to explore how it feels to help others and to be helped by someone. "Give and You Shall Receive" was the theme of another unit. The tale for this lesson, "The Better Offer", is a story of a caravan driver who donates all of his goods to a hungry community instead of selling it to eager merchants. Our class made signs for the food drive in response to this tale. All year this group has been participating in the Gems of Goodness project. They share stories of acts of kindness that they experience each week and are rewarded for positive classroom behavior and participation with "gems" to place in our class gem jar. When this jar is full the class has planned an ice cream party to celebrate reaching their goal.

Have you noticed the tool collection on the wall in our main room? These tools illustrate the qualities that we are discovering in Tool Box of Faith. Our fourth and fifth grade group is having fun working with these tools and exploring the deeper meaning behind each one. The hammer illustrates power and was explored by pounding nails into wood and by learning about Unitarian Abolitionist Theodor Parker and his resistance to unjust laws. A stethoscope was used to illustrate the quality of listening which was practiced by identifying sounds and listening to the story of the desegregation of a Unitarian church in Chicago. We are currently working with sandpaper as a tool to illustrate humor. We will be polishing small pieces of wood and our funny bones as we share jokes and work on a song parody in early April.

Our middle school group has been exploring world religions in Building Bridges. This year they have learned about Judaism, Christianity and Islam. This has been a great opportunity to learn more about these major world religions and to dispel misinformation prevalent in our culture. Several adults have expressed interest in this curriculum as a possible adult RE class.

This year our high school youth group has been very active. This year started off with the Prom hosted by the youth as a camp scholarship fundraiser. They have been involved with helping the Summit community by cleaning up after the breakfast, making hygiene packs and helping with shelter set up. They are currently working on a Youth Service and the annual Rainbow Salad Bar. Three of our high school youth are participating in Sr. High Our Whole Lives at FUUSD. When not involved in a project, our youth group spends their Sunday time together talking about issues that are important to them.

### **Summit Interfaith Shelter News**

The Summit Shelter has been a whirlwind of activity, but in a calm, peaceful, "our casa Summit is your home" kind of way. We began with eight guests, including a young mom and her 4 year old child. The boy has had a difficult life. However, the mornings, evenings and nights at

Summit seem to agree with him. Some of our folks have brought children or grandchildren in order to play with the boy before and after dinner. The boy has greatly benefited from these playtimes, a bit of normal during a tough time. He has also begun sleeping through the night without crying or having a tantrum. We send him and his mom, as well as our other guests, wishes for hope, healing and peace.

Four of our guests are now employed, three just recently while with us. Others have been to job interviews, not quite successful, but are already planning the next job search. It is often usual for the Shelters to perhaps add an additional spontaneous small effort to assist guests with specific needs. We gave one of the men a nice dress shirt to go with his khakis for the interview as well as a new belt. We now have a car-seat so that we can transport the 4 year old and his mother in our cars from Summit to the trolley. She has been walking everywhere, pushing the stroller. She appreciates the ride to and from the trolley. Summitarians have brought toys, soft and cuddly, or other play toys for the 4 year old. He loves the small wooden train set from the RE rooms. The blankets that the RE kids made are a huge hit! The guests were amazed that the children would take the time to make these beautiful, loving gifts. We have VHS's and CD's donated for evening viewing in the Salon. The Kurdish dinner was delicious. Our new Kurdish friends were unsure about being overnights, so two of us pitched in instead. The Imam of the Mosque spoke the grace, supplication, during our pre-dinner circle. Now that they have participated with dinner and had a chance to meet and talk to guests and Summit folks, we hope that being overnights will be a do-able adventure for them on this coming Thursday. Another update will be coming. And, it goes without saying, that meals provided by Summit folks have been delicious, yummy, and plentiful. Our guests have good appetites!

Shelter life is falling into a fairly regular daily rhythm. Yesterday we gained two more guests, a man and woman. We then had four women and six men. Tonight we add two more guests for a total of five women and seven men. The boy, if we count him as a small, growing man, would be an additional guest. We had a surprise last night, a letter from a person in Santee, who had read The East County Californian article about our Shelter and was quite moved. She sent us a spontaneous \$100 Shelter donation.

### **UUA and Summit's Legislative Ministry Team**

...is requesting that you call your Federal legislators and speak with their offices about Compassionate Immigration Reform. Specifically, we'd like you to tell the person:

Your are a person of faith in a Unitarian Universalist congregation, and you would like the (Senator of Congressman/woman, depending on which office you're speaking with) to please support Compassionate Immigration Reform through 5 actions:

1. Demilitarize the border,
2. Legislate the DREAM Act into law to allow children who have lived here most of their lives

to remain in our country and obtain higher education as residents and obtain employment, even if their parents are undocumented immigrants,

3. Create a quick and easy path to citizenship for undocumented immigrants who have lived here for many years without major criminal behavior,

4. Support intact families by allowing undocumented immigrant parents to remain here with their children who are citizens, and allow these parents to obtain employment and higher education as residents,

5. Allow migration for those workers who want to leave for a period of time then return to work here again, as well as migration for indigenous people who migrate back and forth for community and spiritual gatherings.

Then ask the office worker what the Senator's/Congressman's/woman's thoughts are on these issues. (Make a note of what they say so you can let us know if you'd like to do so.)

Then thank the office worker and Senator/Congressman/woman for their time and consideration.
