FROM THE MINISTER'S ROLLTOP:

"Shift Happens"

After having been away five out of the past 8 weeks, I am back in my office, recognizing that during this relatively quiet time around the Summit Community, things continue to change and evolve in our individual lives as well as in our community. May the shifts occurring in your life be gentle, manageable, and welcome, and if not, may you be able to find all the love and strength you need to get through them with your heart, mind and soul intact!

First, I want to thank all of the lay people and guest speakers who have enriched our lives and our understandings about topics that included human trafficking, coming out, UU Justice Ministry, and restorative justice work in our state and local detention facilities and prisons. We are so fortunate to have members, friends and associates who will introduce such activities and topics to us, and challenge us to get involved in making the world a more loving and just place.

Second, I want to let you know that it is often when things are the quietest that new things are percolating and about to happen. With you, I'll look forward to whatever those changes might be in this new Fiscal Year.

Here are some things I know are coming:

“ On Friday, August 8th, and for the foreseeable future, I along with others will be hosting discussions about UU history and identity around the video series

entitled "Long, Strange, Trip: A journey through two thousand years of Unitarian Universalist History."

- “ On Sunday, August 24th, our service will focus on using artistic and musical expression to illustrate our individual and collective roles as co-creators of the realities we inhabit. EACH SUMMIT MEMBER AND FRIEND IS INVITED TO SUBMIT ONE PIECE OF VISUAL ART FOR DISPLAY AT THIS SERVICE. (just bring it by the office with your name and the name of the piece attached to it by Tuesday, August 19th.)

- “ At our Ingathering Service on September 7th, we will celebrate a Water Communion and Service of Blessing and Welcome for the Children in our Community. Members and friends of Summit are encouraged to bring a small container of water from home or from travels abroad for this wonderful ritual occasion.

- “ Starting in mid-September Summit will begin to advertise and formalize a Sunday meditation service from 8-8:45 a.m. and a UU Work and Worship Gathering on Friday evenings from 6-8:00 p.m. Our current Sunday Service, which runs from 10 – 11:15 a.m., along with our traditions of Salon Café, Circle Discussion or Congregational Meetings after service will continue unchanged.

FROM OUR SUMMIT LEADERSHIP

From Your President

When I first began attending Summit, new friends would occasionally say to me,

“Thank you for your service.” I puzzled a bit to place this phrase in the context of my helping out, thinking that the small help I gave was perhaps minimally worthy of praise. Or, that my work was a given, that I might indeed assist when able, even in the rush and pressure of everyday life. Or, that the phrase was an unusual application of the word “service.” Over the years, this phrase has become a meaningful gem for me, a powerful yet humble expression, tied to our Summit values and covenants.

This past Thursday, July 17, 2014 your Summit Board held the annual transition meeting, moving from the prior Board constellation, to the newly elected Board. Your 2014-2015 Board is ready and able to serve. During the chalice lighting at this meeting, we enjoyed the sharing of a lovely inspirational poem by Margo Mariana. Margo then remained for the meeting, a welcome guest and observer.

Board business included the following, among other items. We addressed the need to clarify the Board’s spending policy. Our leadership list requires updating. Several of our Summit Committees/Working Groups no longer have members, or enough members, to do their intended functions, such as Library, Adult RE, Event Assist/Setup, cooperative site Maintenance and Fundraising. If you are interested, please let Toni Rogers know and she will give you more information. Summit continues to move forward on community outreach in many forms. A new tab, button on the public page of Summit’s website, perhaps titled Participate Now (open to suggestions) is under consideration. This would publicize Summit events such as the recent JoBozMo concert which are open to the greater San Diego and East County community. Member sign in would not be required for this tab.

Our Summit Board functions under the basic principles of Policy Governance, not direct management. “Hmm,” you may say, “okay?!” Here are some of the driving thoughts. The Board speaks with one voice or not at all. Board decisions are predominantly policy decisions. The Board formulates policy by determining the broadest values before progressing to more narrow ones. The Board defines and delegates, rather than reacting and ratifying. There is more. If you would enjoy a written handout, please let me know. An excellent way to see Policy Governance in action is to attend Board meetings as an observer.

Any Summit member is cordially invited to attend Board meetings. We are a lively and diverse Board, making for an interesting evening. Your Board meets each third Thursday of the month, from approximately 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., generally in the library. The upcoming August meeting is the exception, being the Board Retreat, and not open

to guests. See you in September.

From Your Treasurer

Preliminary year-end reports for fiscal year 2013-14 are looking very good. Our total income was approximately \$11,000 higher than projected, primarily due to a very successful Auction. Total expenses were approximately \$10,000 less than projected, primarily due to conservative spending by staff and committees. (Thank you!!!) Uncollected pledges came to \$8,872 only 3.8% of the total amount pledged, which is considered good. Overall we had a net income of approximately \$19,000.

Current liquid assets (cash in the bank) are approximately \$112,000 of which almost half is in restricted accounts (funds designated for specific purposes such as the Walden House, SAC causes, and the newly approved Campus Improvement/Emergency Fund). That means we have approximately \$59,000 available for running the fellowship. Our current policy is to keep at least \$45,000 available for monthly income fluctuations (approximately two months of expenses). This is necessary as we usually receive less in income than we spend each month, other than in the months of the Auction, December and June.

We have received approximately \$250,000 in pledges for the current year, compared to \$232,000 last year. Thank you for your generosity!!

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION FOR ALL

Children's Religious Exploration News

It's hard to believe that the summer is almost over! We started our Double- Doctor-Discovery summer program in June; July was filled with camps and continued Sunday fun; and now it's August and we are getting ready for the start of our regular "school

year.” On July 26th we had our annual Children’s Religious Exploration Retreat, where parents and teachers gathered to take a look at the past year and plan for the fall and the future. Here are some of the highlights of our meeting:

What went well in 2013-14:

- “ Mary’s time increased to 30 hrs. for 2014-15!!!!
- “ Bigger Teaching Teams – 8 Teachers per group = over 45 volunteers. Great diversity of ages and whole community involvement - parents/non-parents, young adults, elders, male, female, yea!
- “ YAK –Youth Action Kommittee (Committee with a K) – Middle & High School – Activities included fun, fundraising and service to Summit.
- “ RE services – Holiday, RE Sunday, Youth (Fandom) service.
- “ Summer of the Doctors – the Science of Seuss and Doctor WhUU. Content created by Mary just for Summit.
- “ Youth/Child participation in 25th Anniversary activities: talent show, Auction, Founders Path, Empty Bowls and many more. Many engaged in Intergenerational activities!
- “ Social Action Sundays are age-appropriate. Topics were good. Kids helped with collecting tangible donations, not cash.

What could be improved?

- “ More bonding time for teaching teams has been requested.
- “ Would like more consistent youth attendance.
- “ Parents need to pick up their kids by 12:00 pm. Parents chatting and late circle discussions cause late pick-ups.
- “ Have a “Lead” team teacher for each team.
- “ More child-friendly social action projects in the community – i.e. food bank, park clean-ups, etc.
- “ Church safety policy improvement – include an annual CRE fire drill as part of program.
- “ Continue offering leadership growth opportunities for children and youth including building a “Tree House Covenant.”

Our discussion included communication between the CRE program, families, and the congregation. Weekly CRE email is great and continues to be appreciated and is a very effective tool. Mary expressed the need for annual registration of all families to update files and have current safety information available for all children. We reviewed and added to our five-year plan for the CRE program.

We looked at the curricula for the upcoming year and the overall plan for our children and youth, to better see what the full religious exploration opportunity is at Summit. There are currently five age-based classrooms, plus the nursery, with two and three year curriculum rotations. The curricula are geared to give each person an experience that includes exploration of Unitarian Universalist principles, sources, identity and values; exploration of world religions, cultures, and their stories; opportunities to participate in and lead worship and song; leadership and social action opportunities to build a culture within, of giving as a way of living faith values; and experiences that include art, theater, and other forms of creativity. We also looked at the current registration list, projected class sizes, and planned classroom spaces for the fall.

Plans for this coming year include the following ideas:

- “ Some classroom rotation to make sure that larger groups have the space they need.
- “ After-church or mid-week groups for more multi-age activities and leadership building opportunities. These ideas include:
 - * Children’s Choir
 - * Summit Minecraft Server for a UU Covenant group gaming experience all week long.
 - * Knitting/Crocheting group for children & youth.
 - * Continued support of Youth Action Kommittee and their activities.
- “ Our Whole Lives (OWL) and Coming of Age (COA) in 2014-15
- “ Many Intergenerational “Family nights” to include: Family Jam Social (Dance), Halloween/Fandom Party, Holiday Ornament Making and Sing-a-Long, Winter Game Night, and a Family Camping Weekend.
- “ Youth group trip to General Assembly in Portland Oregon in 2015!

There are so many wonderful ideas that were shared and I have only highlighted a few.

If you would like to see all of the notes, let me know and I can get them to you. The bottom line is that we have a rich program that is guided by the needs of our families and our congregation. It is the participation of all of us though the gift of our time and support that allows this program to thrive.

How Can You Help Summit’s Social Action Efforts?

Esperanza School Collection- August’s Social Action collection will be for the support of a student at the private, nonprofit school, Colegio de la Esperanza, which is located in a very poor neighborhood of Tijuana in which many homes lack electricity or running water. The Tijuana public school system is quite limited so the enriching education provided at Colegio de la Esperanza provides hope and promise to those students lucky enough to attend. However, the school is always short on money to pay teachers and cover other costs. For more than 11 years, Summit has been sponsoring a student at Esperanza. The Social Action Committee will be collecting funds for a tuition scholarship on Sunday, August 17th, in hopes of reaching or even surpassing the \$540 needed to provide a full scholarship to one student for an entire year. This year Summit will be supporting Kiara Alia Rodriguez Arteaga, an upcoming third grader at the Esperanza School. Kiara is the smartest child in her class and received multiple awards last year for her work in second grade. Her education could bring wonderful things to her struggling neighborhood.

You can add your photo to your profile in the Membership Directory after you have registered (once your registration has been activated). Here's how:

1. Select the photo you want to use and place it on your computer desktop.
2. Log in on www.summituuf.org and you will find yourself in the Member Area.
3. Select "Your Profile" to access the Member Profile page.
4. You'll see "Upload" under the shadow of an image. Click "Upload" to upload your photo from your desktop. **Note:** If you want to change your photo at a later date, just repeat this process with a different picture.
