October 5th: *"Blessed for Success!"* Rev. Frank Placone-Willey

The days of the American Dream and its definitions of success are behind us now. The old methods and recipes for realizing the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness are overshadowed by a closing circle of economic, political and ecological degradation. How, then, shall we the people who seek and sustain the beloved community, respond? How can we redefine, invite, and challenge others to a new kind of success?

Our Living Tradition has emerged from the Protestant notion that each of us is a priest and minister in the Beloved Community. What are the implications of such a view for our fellowship? How can this way of living and working together impact the world on whose behalf we are called to live and serve? October 19th: *"Social Justice Whack-A-Mole"* Rev. Frank Placone-Willey

Toward the end of his life and ministry the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was discouraged by the realization that racism is integrally related to the negative and degrading effects of classism, militarism and poverty. Along the way, we have also identified other forms of human oppression and alienation like sexism, ableism and homophobia. In the quest for a freer and more civil society, our communities continue to be afflicted with such problems, and our ways of trying to resolve them are largely reactive and piecemeal. How can you and I dispose our energy, attention, and the resources at hand to bring an end to human-caused and human-allowed suffering?

October 26th: *"The Apocalypse of Peter Higgs"* Rev. Frank Placone-Willey

In 1841 our Unitarian forebear Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, *"The religion that is afraid of science dishonors God and commits suicide."* In today's reflection Rev. Frank will address the beauties and limitations of science and scientific ways of knowing. Come celebrate a deeper appreciation of science's contributions to our understanding of the universe, the ways in which science has contributed to the improvement and lengthening of human life, and our evolving Unitarian Universalist faith.

How Can You Help Summit's Social Action Efforts?

Peanut Butter and Jelly Collection- It's time for our annual PB&J collection! Please remember to bring jars of peanut butter and/or jelly (bread is welcome too) to the service on October 19 (Social Action

Sunday). How about putting these on your shopping list right now? Your donated sandwich-makings will be taken to Crisis House to provide many low cost, nutritious meals for families and individuals in need.

Everyday Social Action- the Social Action theme for the coming year is “Everyday Social Action.” What do you do to make the world a better place? Summitarians will be sharing their Everyday Social Action practices during the upcoming year- we look forward to hearing your ideas and practices as well!

Providing meals to homeless people and caring for dogs at the animal shelter are highlighted this month. Here are submissions from two Summit members:

Feeding the homeless- every Thursday night, the dharma bums (of the dharma bum temple downtown) get together to repurpose and distribute food to the homeless in downtown San Diego. Anyone is welcome to be a part of the program. we basically make a few hundred or so (thanksgiving we had about 500) meals out of rice, some repurposed thai restaurant food, fresh organic produce from a local farmer’s market, peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, fruit, tuna fish sandwiches, bagels, and anything else we may collect or bring with us.

Our job is to repurpose, divide, and then individually pass out the food to the homeless on the streets of downtown San Diego. We tend to see the same people often, and they are usually looking for us to show up with anticipation. We are one of the only downtown programs that does not require listening to a sermon, reading a tract, or accepting Jesus before eating. We give with no expectations and out of kindness and love for our fellow humans.

It is a tremendous privilege to be able to do this. I have long struggled with my own periods of homelessness as well as the homeless lifestyle of my mother. I have become appreciative of all the people who are a part of making this happen every week, and there is a definite sense of sangha (community) in doing it together. It is a tangible thing I do on Thursdays and which brings me great satisfaction and joy whenever I am part of it.

Walking the Dog- As a long time animal lover, I spend a portion of each week as a volunteer “dog walker” for the San Diego County Department of Animal Services shelter, located in Bonita.

I find it very fulfilling to give an often frightened and lonely animal a precious moment of companionship and caring. The variety of ways many of the dogs have been unloved, neglected, and abused is a sad tale.

While rewarding, this is not an easy task. There are simply too many dogs for one person to walk, and although I am one of many, there are still not enough volunteers to meet the need. This means choices have to be made as to what dogs you choose to walk. Trying to choose when there are several pairs of pleading eyes fixed on you is a daunting, (and haunting), choice to make.

But the joy expressed by the dogs in their enthusiasm to be out of the kennel and doing a normal dog activity, like going for a walk, is boundless. The fact that something so simple can result in so much joy is a marvel to behold. Gary Baldwin

Restorative Justice Training- For anyone interested in getting involved in Restorative Justice work - there is a training available October 23, 24 and 25 for anyone interested in becoming a facilitator of the

Victim Offender Dialogues.

The Restorative Justice Mediation Program (RJMP) offers crime victims and juvenile and adult offenders an effective alternative to the traditional criminal justice system. RJMP offers its services to probation, the police, the courts, and other service agencies. RJMP gives offenders a chance to take responsibility and make amends as well as giving the victim a voice and an opportunity to ask questions and to describe the effects of the offense. The process begins the healing for the victim, the offender, and the community.

Victim-Offender dialogue facilitation differs from traditional mediation. It requires offenders to take responsibility for the harm they have done victims. It helps to provide equitable restitution to the victim, and is proven to reduce the probability that an offender will re-offend.

This facilitator training is intended for all persons interested in becoming RJMP facilitators but will benefit teachers, defense attorneys, and others -- especially those involved with children, teenagers and young adults. Trainees who agree to facilitate cases with RJMP will receive valuable experience in conflict resolution and skills transferable to all walks of life. The course includes 20 hours of basic Victim-Offender Mediation/Dialogue Training using lectures, videos, and role play. Instruction, training manual and lunch on Friday and Saturday will be provided.

Sessions: Thurs. 6:00 -9:00 pm, Fri. 8:30am - 5:00 pm, and Sat. 8:30 am - 5:00 pm.

Cost of training: \$150.00, \$75.00 for students with current ID and anyone 65 or over.
