FROM OUR SUMMIT LEADERSHIP

August 2015 President Report

General Assembly 2015 in Portland, Oregon still echoes in my mind. Over 4,500 Unitarian Universalists attended. We received the news during one of the general sessions that the Marriage Equality Act had passed. Instant exuberant and joyous celebration! The five days of the General Assembly provided an incredible bounty of over 500 workshops, lectures and special ceremonies. Some of the offerings that I attended were, for instance: Bridging Cultures through International UU Coalitions; Accountable Leadership; Finding Our Way Back to Right Relationships; Let Ours be No Silent Witness: Micro-aggressions matter; Creating Leadership Opportunities for Growth in a Diverse World; Spiritual Practices of Writing that Open Doors; Finding Ourselves in the International UU Story.

Here are just a few of the myriad important thoughts shared at the 2015 General Assembly:

- “ Hospitality is a basic value and the first step to dismantling barriers in the world.
- “ Collective vision and collaboration opens doors.
- “ Differences are needed to make the whole, otherwise we will be all ears, or all mouths, or all hands. Be affirming of those who gather.
- “ People are needed in the room to grow the vision.
- “ Be invitational: invite diverse folks to the table. Look for those not in the room.
- “ Words matter, make them ring true. Micro aggressions cause hurt and damage.
- “ Leadership practices can foster inclusion: be flexible, share information, assume good intentions, no blame game or finger pointing, mistakes are learning opportunities.
- “ Listen.
- “ The team includes people who do not think the way you do. Allow differing perspectives to be voiced. Watch out for congregational barriers as to who can do what.
- “ Be an ambassador for, not a refugee from. Define what you stand for.

Opportunities abound for Summit to participate in the web of life across the globe. While at the general assembly, I was asked to write an article for the UU Partner Church News, a publication that connects UU congregations around the globe, regarding my recent experience with two UU Fellowships in Japan. In February 2017, there will be an International Women’s Convocation in California, with the goal of helping to build just societies worldwide. Summit can apply to be recognized as an accredited UU Green Congregation. The Green Sanctuary designation is based on a framework of four focus areas: Environmental Justice, Worship and Celebration, Religious Education, Sustainable Living. As of June 30, 2015, there are 250 accredited Green Sanctuaries in the United States. The Unitarian Universalist Association has representation at the United Nations Office (UU-UNO) and is engaged in international advocacy for Unitarian Universalist values. Congregations/Fellowships can choose to be represented in this global capacity. We can list our Summit Sangha with the nationwide UU Buddhist Fellowship Sangha. When we participate in these opportunities, our UU voices grow stronger not just locally, or nationally, but also around and across our Blue Boat Home.

Let’s continue to define what Summit stands for.

From the Finance Cmte Chairperson

2015-16 Summit UU Budget Approved at 6/14 Congregational meeting. Income is based primarily on pledged income of \$254,300, auction income of \$30,000, an annual plate of \$8,000, and a one-time transfer of \$8,000 from savings (less than 50% of last year's net income). Expenses include the following increases: 10% for the Minister (previously 18% below the UUA recommendation for this size congregation); 2.5% for all other staff members (meeting or exceeding the minimum UUA recommendations for their positions); 1% in retirement benefits for the staff (providing a 7% benefit which is on target to reach the recommended UUA goal of 10% over the next 3 years; music program enhancements; and increases in professional development for the Director of Children’s Religious Education, childcare expenses and dues.

Positive Year-End Results for Fiscal 2014-15 thanks to your Continued Generous

Contributions. Year-end financial highlights include: auction fundraising income brought in approximately \$8,500 over budget; which along with concerts, new member donations and gifts yielded total income of approximately \$17,000 over budget! Expenses continued to be well-managed with a savings of approximately \$8,500. As a result, total income exceeded expenses for the year by approximately \$26,000. Summit UU is truly blessed with a fellowship committed to financial integrity and generosity.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION FOR ALL

Children's Religious Exploration News

Even in summer our Religious Exploration (CRE) program is hopping. Two creative and fun programs are happening on Sundays, and plans are under way for our 2015-16 CRE year. Summit youth had transformative experiences of intentional community up at the camps, too, with 14 youth participating over two weeks. We even had a youth delegate participate in Youth Caucus at the UUA General Assembly. There are no "lazy days of summer" here!

At the end of the CRE year, we held our annual Religious Exploration Retreat. All adults who participate in our CRE programming were invited to join us in evaluating the previous year, looking at goals and planning for the next year. We had ten participants working together to create the best program possible for our unique community. The plans made will guide me in this very important work, as well as the Children's Religious Exploration Committee. Here are some of the things we will be working on during the next year:

- Creating a SUUF CRE Facebook Group for families. (This is already up and running!)
- Continuing to meet the needs of our children and youth with OWL and COA programs.
- Continue to support UU amp and the camp scholarship fund.
- Change CRE Meetings to be on the second Sunday of the month, before the service.
- Encourage parents of younger children to be part of the CRE committee.
- Create a teacher application process as we continue to support and build our incredible CRE volunteer teams.

· And many more ideas that are in the works!

Our fall classroom plans are also off to a great start. The CRE Committee and I are actively working to build “dream teams” for each age group. Our curriculum plans are as follows:

Nursery – Infant to 4 years – Cathy will continue to work with one volunteer each week to provide a loving safe place for our babies and toddlers. We currently have three children who are consistently here each week!

Spirit Play - Pre-K to 1st Grade – This is a Montessori-style classroom that focuses on using stories as a way to discover UU values. Children hear a story at the beginning of the class and then get to process the tale through individual exploration using manipulative felt shapes, art, games and more. Activities are added that are specific to the week and there are regular favorites available as well. Each class ends with a communal “feast” to share.

Love Will Guide Us – 2nd & 3rd Grade – Stars are used as symbols to guide children on a journey of discovery of the six sources that UU’s look to for inspiration. Each week a story is shared that relates to one of our sources. This is followed by activities that encourage deeper exploring. Over the year this group will become aware of their sense of wonder, learn from the teachings of prophetic people, look for wisdom among world religions, including Jewish and Christian teachings, look at the harmony in nature and discoveries in science, as all are sources of inspiration for Unitarian Universalists. Guided by love and the stars, they will continue their journey of discovery.

Sing with the Power & Tool Box of Faith – 4th & 5th Grade – We are expanding the program for our older children by mashing up two curriculums this year. Both have a justice focus and hold up examples of individuals who have made a difference through action. Together, this group will explore their values and discover “tools” that they can use to make positive change in their lives and the world. There will be song, creativity, games and they may even get messy occasionally. It should be lots of fun!

Quest for the Chalice – Middle School Youth – This year our younger youth will be exploring world religions. This can be a formative year for this age as they discover the myriad of belief systems that are available. I am adapting the Building Bridges curriculum that we used in the past to be more of a Quest experience, (think Lord of the Rings), than a series of lectures. The goal is to make self discoveries in the safety of beloved community. This will include visits from members of the faith community and maybe even a field trip or two. Life is a quest for understanding and this group will be starting on their epic journey together.

YRUU – High School Youth Group – Once again our older youth will be taking on leadership to create their own programming. They will decide together what the group goals are and pick activities to lead and share with each other. They will participate in social action activities, create worship experiences, learn and explore together while having fUUn! I can’t wait to see what this dynamic group will do!

Join us! - Be part of the fun! I’m building our teaching teams. If you have participated in the past, we want you back! Are you new to Summit or to teaching in CRE? Let’s talk! There are lots of ways to be part of this incredible journey. The children and youth at Summit are a beautiful example of open minds, loving hearts and helping hands. We are truly blessed to be part of their journey. By supporting their exploration and discoveries, we make the world a better place.

Attending events at the camp will also help the facility recover from being closed for three weeks during it's busy season due to the fire. UUJM members joined A.L.E.C. Protest on July 22nd, 2015: Jack Shu, Richard Hoverstock, and Joanna Jones joined the rally in downtown San Diego to protest the American Legislative Exchange Council (A.L.E.C.) lobbyists and legislators at the Manchester Grand Hyatt, (July 22nd– 25th).

ALEC meets to discuss conservative legislation, such as opposing gun control, tougher action on unauthorized immigrants, weaken unions, weaken EPA regulations, get rid of Obamacare, and cutting employee pay and benefits.

We met with about 1,000 people at 4:00 pm at the Embarcadero Marina Park. Groups present included Teamsters, Home Care Workers, United Domestic Workers, and labor leaders. Busses brought union members from near-by areas. We carried signs saying “Democracy, not ALEC \$\$\$, Vote”, “ALEC not welcome” and “Overturn Citizens United.”

Jack Shu knew and talked with many people and leaders. We also met other UUs, 2 from 1st Church, 2 from Palomar, several from out of the county. Democracy requires participation !!!!

Opening for a pianist who will accompany the Summit Choir

-The accompanist will play piano for the Summit Fellowship Choir (a.k.a. *The Summit Singers*), and may participate in other aspects of the Fellowship's music program.

-The accompanist must be available to play for every Wednesday night choir rehearsal from 7-8:30 p.m. (from mid-August through mid-June) AND for two Sunday Services a month from 9:00 a.m.-11:15 a.m. (Services in which the Choir sings involve 2 songs.)

-The accompanist will be available, when possible, to substitute for our regular pianist who plays on Sundays when the Choir is not singing.

-Experience in choir accompaniment is expected. Advanced sight-reading skills and comfort with leading sectionals are a must. The accompanist will play under the Choir Director's lead for rehearsals, warm-ups, sectionals, and services and be able to play hymns or worship songs that involve congregational singing. Knowledge of Unitarian Universalist worship and music is preferred. The

accompanist must be able and willing to take about 15 minutes after every few rehearsals to make recordings for the choir.

-Summit is looking for an accompanist who is personable, hospitable, adaptable, and willing and able to work well with the Choir Director, Minister, other musicians, and the all-volunteer choir whose members vary widely in their talent and understanding of music.

Initial interviews will end by August 25, 2015. Auditions for finalists will take place on Wednesday evening, August 26th at the first rehearsal of the 2015 - 2016 Choir Year.

In January, I volunteered to oversee the completion of the Walden Project. For those of you who do not know, The Walden Project is a grassroots, congregation-based, inter-generational learning project of Summit Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You can read all about this project and see some great photos at www.TheWaldenProject.org. In the fall of 2011, many Summit Volunteers began building the tiny house that now sits in the Summit parking lot. The house is built on a trailer designed and built by FE Trailers, a family company of the McQuaides, who are members of our Fellowship.

Thanks to all the Summit Volunteers, the "bones" of Walden have been built and all the necessities (like a toilet, shower, solar inverter, heater, and water system) installed.
