**September 6th: "Nothing Alien"**

Rev. Frank Placone-Willey

"Man is the measure of all things," wrote the ancient Greek philosopher Protagoras. This one statement perhaps best captures the philosophical tradition of Humanism that is named one of the sources of our Living Tradition in our UU Principles and Purposes. In today's reflection, Rev. Frank will focus on the positive contributions and limitations of a Humanistic perspective in our quest for a more just and democratic world. This is Labor Day Sunday...come dressed in some way that expresses your solidarity with the workers of the world.

**September 13th: "Spiraling Into the Future" (Water Communion)**

This is our annual Ingathering service, a coming together of our congregation at the conclusion of Summer to mark the start of a new year of Religious Exploration. In this Service we will reflect together whence we have come and where we are headed together as a congregation, as a society, as a species, and as a world. All participants are invited to bring some water from their home, travels, or some special place, to contribute to our ritual of water communion.

**September 20th: "A Whole New Story"**

"We don't see the world as it is, we see it as we are" wrote the cosmopolitan literata Anias Nin. How we see the world, ourselves and each other is shaped by the stories we tell ourselves. Can these stories be changed? Is it even possible to get beyond them to see and engage the world as it truly is? Drawing on Buddhist teachings and the philosophy of science, Rev. Frank will offer some possible prescriptions for people who are seeking to expand their faith, freedom, and capacities to love.

**September 27th: "Do Black Lives Matter?"** Jack Shu and the Summit Justice Ministry

Summit's Justice Ministry work calls us to witness and to take action. Three presenters will tell their personal experience on why the Black Lives Matter movement is relevant and important to them and our community. Maxine Sherard, a woman who was arrested at her own home for helping a homeless person. Aaron Harvey, who spent months in jail charged for murder because he was on a list of gang members. Anne Barron, who has seen bias police actions and is now an activist for justice.

**FROM THE MINISTER'S ROLLTOP:**

**"Have Faith!"**

*"For truly, I say to you, if you have faith as a grain of mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible to you."*

We UU's don't like people telling us what we have to believe in order to be worthy of acceptance and love. We reject the idea that one should conform to a certain set of beliefs in order to belong to a spiritual community. For us, faith is not about believing or conforming to doctrines or dogmas based on metaphysical assumptions, but rather faith is a matter of *intention* and *confidence*.

It is interesting to me that Jesus, as he is represented in the Christian scriptures, seemed to hold a similar understanding of faith. How you and I dispose the energy and attention that is available to us in order to accomplish something (and holding confidence that what we set out to accomplish, within a certain set of given circumstances, it can be accomplished) is how we can best understand what faith is.

It takes faith to work for the changes we would like to see in the world. It takes faith to build the beloved community in which all lives matter. It takes faith to stand on the side of love, to stand against, and ultimately break, the hold of ideologies of domination and privilege that now rule so much of what is now happening on this planet. It takes determined, patient, strategic dispositions of individual and collective energy to stand for compassion, justice and sustainability in the face of dehumanization, oppression and violence.

To cultivate and possess such faith is an opportunity which life affords us all. Whether we choose to have such faith or not, is itself a matter of faith.

What kind of world do you want to see? How do you want to dispose the energy and attention that is available to you to leave this world better than it now is? How far are you willing to go to bring about the realization of love and justice in all the affairs of humankind?

Join me as we continue seeking answers to these questions for ourselves, our congregation, and this amazing life into which we have been thrown.

### FROM OUR SUMMIT LEADERSHIP

#### *August 2015 President Report*

Summit's beloved Salon Sunday Café was an urgent, important item on the August 20th, 2015 Board Meeting Agenda. Each Sunday, Summit volunteers set up many, many chairs, outside umbrellas and chairs as well, make urns of coffee, hot water for tea, shop for and lay out a delicious, tempting feast for us, and then reverse the process with extensive clean up and take down of tables and chairs. There are often 80-100 people in our wonderful Salon to partake of Summit's hospitality. In my presidential crystal ball, I can see an apocalyptic, near dooms-day scenario. The door to the Salon Café is locked, the lights are out, our Sunday Café is dark. Because the Salon innkeepers are very kind and caring folks, there is a plate of cookies outside the door, with a sign "take one." Dazed, you take a cookie out to your car and eat it. If you are not in the first 20 folks at the darkened Salon door, there are no cookies left. No volunteer has shopped. In stunned disbelief, you aimlessly wander up and down Buena Vista and/or Cottonwood Avenue.

No way, you say! But, yes way, seriously. Currently there are only 3-4 Summitarians, pretty much the same brave folks, working the Café, week after week! The Board has begun a search for solutions together with Erin and Wes Collins. In case you weren't able to attend the Sunday Service on August 23rd, please know that Reverend Frank spoke from the pulpit to address the need for assistance with the recurring tasks of the Sunday Café. So, in the meantime, if you are available to help with the Sunday Café, please talk to Erin and Wes.

On a personal note: small-scale social justice, big payoff.

I attend a monthly meeting outside of Summit and have done so for several years. Recently with the addition of a new member, my Black Lives Matter detector and "bull" meter have been ticking during the meetings, quietly at first, and then insistently. The 2015 Spring Open House dissolved into chaos with unmistakable racist language. At the following meeting, my friend and I stood and spoke regarding the events of the Open House. While attempting to speak, we had the unforgettable, adrenaline-generating experience of being yelled at with shouts to sit down, drop it, shut up and more, by several racist members. Feeling quite shaken, my heart pounding, I did however remain standing to finish what I had to say. My thoughts and feelings ranged from horror, to anger, to the need to flee, to rational thoughts and seeking solutions. My friend sadly has often had similar public and other hurtful experiences before. At the end of this meeting, one of the racist people blocked our exit, standing in front of us, walking alongside of me, still shouting more of the same. The other members that were present did not intervene. I had a nearly overwhelming urge to quit this group right then. I thought of our Summit UU Mission Statement, "In spiritual community, we are committed to building a compassionate, just and sustainable world." Our Summit Covenant

affirmations anchored me. Because the tendency within this group is to overlook and be silent, several of us are now getting together, determined to actively identify the racism, to speak honest, direct words at the next meetings, to continue bringing the issue into the light, giving it a much needed overt, not hidden, existence. I confess to the urge to invite Cornel West, a speaker at UU General Assembly, to upcoming meetings for a bit of cleansing fire and brimstone!

Documentation has been forwarded to the California State level of this organization and they have been responsive. This is a work in progress. I have already felt a personal growing empowerment and hope. Two recent quotes regarding ongoing racism in America are:

*“America will only end racism when it stops being racist. Not a minute sooner. ... In the long run, I’m an optimist. But a post-racial future will not just appear. There is urgent work to do.”*

# RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION FOR ALL

## **Children's Religious Exploration News**

It is that time again, the beginning of a new church year! Summit Children's Religious Exploration is in full swing planning and preparing lessons. Our teaching teams are coming together and I'm organizing schedules and prepping classrooms for a fun year of exploration and community building with our children and youth.

Below are the curriculums we are going to use this year. We're expanding our elementary lessons to have more stories and activities by using two curriculums for each grade level. I am creating a new curriculum for the Middle School group by blending the world religions curriculum with a Lord-of-the-Rings-style quest for knowledge. This was something that our youth requested and are very interested in exploring!

Each program is lead by a teaching team, pairing experienced teachers with new ones, to provide a loving safe environment for our children and youth to explore and experience spiritual growth. Below is a description of each age group and the programs we'll start this fall:

**Nursery** – Cathy will continue to work with one volunteer each week to provide a loving safe place for our babies and toddlers. We currently have three children who are consistently here each week!

**Pre K to 1<sup>st</sup> Grade - Spirit Play** - This is a Montessori-style classroom that focuses on using stories as a way to discover UU values. Children listen to a story at the beginning of class and then get to process the it through individual exploration using manipulative felt pieces, art, games and more. Activities are added that are specific to each week's story, along with the favorites available as well. Each class ends with a communal "feast."

**Second and Third Grade – Love will Guide Us and Spring Gardening** - Stars are used as symbols to guide children on a journey of discovery of the six sources that UU's look to for inspiration. Each week a story is shared that explores one of the sources. This is followed by activities that encourage deeper understanding and experiences. Over the year this group will explore their sense of wonder, learn from the teachings of prophetic people, explore the wisdom of world religions, including Jewish and Christian teachings, look to the harmony in nature and discoveries in science, as all are sources of inspiration for Unitarian Universalists. Guided by love and the stars, they will continue their journey of discovery. This year we'll expand our exploration of the natural world by growing a winter and spring garden, too. This will enhance their experiences with "hands on" opportunities to grow things and get messy!

**Fourth and Fifth Grade – Sing to the Power and Tool Box of Faith** – We are expanding the program for our older children by mashing up two curriculums. Both have a justice focus and hold up examples of individuals who have made a difference through action. Together, this group will explore their values and discover "tools" that they can use to make positive change in their lives and the world. There will be song, creativity, games, and they may even get messy occasionally. It should be lots of fun!

**Middle School – Fellowship of the Epic QUUest!** - This year we are creating our own adventure as

we begin a quest for a “sacred chalice.” Inspired by *Lord of the Rings*, Arthurian legends, and other epic adventures, our youth will work together to seek knowledge from the world’s major religions and in the process possibly find our individual “sacred chalices.” We will explore their basic beliefs and practices, inviting guests from, or those with understanding of, other faiths to visit with us. Seeking understanding will encourage our youth to discover hidden wisdom “treasures.” We hope to go on field trips to other places of worship if possible! The goal is for the group to work together to support each other through this “Fellowship of the Epic QUUest.”

**Senior High Youth Group – YRUU** - High School Youth Group – Once again our youth will be taking on leadership roles to create their own programming. As a group they will decide what their goals will be and choose corresponding activities. They will be participating in social action activities, creating worship, learning and exploring together while having fun! I can’t wait to see what this dynamic group does!

In addition, we will work on a holiday play, *Our Whole Lives*, for upper elementary, and a spring Coming of Age program. This will be a busy and full year!

**Join us!** - Be part of the fun! I’m organizing our teaching teams. If you’ve participated in the past, we want you back! Are you new to Summit or to teaching in CRE? Let’s talk! There are lots of ways to be part of this incredible journey. The children and youth at Summit are a beautiful example of open minds, loving hearts and helping hands. We are truly blessed to be part of their journey. By supporting their exploration and discoveries, we make the world a better place.

You can read all about this project and see some great photos at [www.TheWaldenProject.org](http://www.TheWaldenProject.org). In the fall of 2011, many Summit Volunteers began building the tiny house that now sits in the Summit

parking lot. The house is built on a trailer designed and built by FE Trailers, a family company of the McQuaides, who are members of our Fellowship.

Thanks to all the Summit Volunteers, the "bones" of Walden have been built and all the necessities (like a toilet, shower, solar inverter, heater, and water system) installed.

In January, a friend of the Fellowship, Terry Hagberg, of Hagberg Construction, was recruited to help us with completion of the project. Terry agreed to volunteer his time and bring in his own contractors to finish the project. We still have much to do.
