FROM THE MINISTER'S ROLLTOP:

“Who’s Running the Show, and How?”

“By means of ever more effective methods of mind-manipulation, the democracies will change their nature; the quaint old forms—elections, parliaments, Supreme Courts and all the rest—will remain.

The underlying substance will be a new kind of totalitarianism. All the traditional names, all the hallowed slogans will remain exactly what they were in the good old days. Democracy and freedom will be the theme of every broadcast and editorial. Meanwhile the ruling oligarchy and its highly trained elite of soldiers, policemen, thought-manufacturers and mind-manipulators will quietly run the show as they see fit.” -Aldous Huxley, Brave New World, Revisited; 1958

Huxley saw what is happening now. Power that is not in the service of love is being sought by, and concentrated in, the hands of a few. Predictably, these few, and the organizational structures they spawn, will continue to use the aggregating power they have to gain more control over the hearts, minds, bodies and productive capacities of everyone else. Wittingly or unwittingly, they will support anything that turns us into docile bodies that serve their interests. They will seek domination over all, and those who do not fall into line. Those who resist, and who enjoy too much freedom from their control, will be ridiculed, imprisoned, or dispatched. Spiritually and morally bankrupt, the most powerful few will nevertheless justify their actions as rational, ethical and practical. Empires and oligarchies do not want people to be too concerned about being good or actively concerned with making the world a welcoming and happy home for all.

This is why the only suitable and persistent response to power is to subject all power to love: love of self, love of all others, love of the earth and all living things. And by love, I mean specifically "a sacred obligation, freely chosen, to act with care toward one's self and toward others." Such is not the way of those who pursue power for power's sake.

Love cannot be legislated or forced or realized solely through the application of one or more ideological and economic theories.

Power in the service of love can only be realized voluntarily, in and by communities like this one here, and it can only be encouraged through invitation and prophetic challenge, including non-violent activism of all sorts.

To make a choice to love, and to use all the power one has available to himself or herself to make such a choice, is the greatest freedom we have. Finally, it is the only true moral and ethical choice. Ultimately, it is the most radical thing that we can do.

FROM OUR SUMMIT LEADERSHIP

President's Report

In the September 2015 President's Report, I shared a personal Black Lives Matter experience which occurred at meetings that I regularly attend outside of Summit. Unexpectedly, racism on the part of a few members became a major issue during these meetings. The update and resolution is as follows. The offending members of the executive board were asked to either step down or to be officially removed. The consequence of being officially removed is to be banned from joining any local, state, or national chapter of this organization. The board officers chose to step down. The meetings have now resumed with a cordial atmosphere. In addition to protests, marches and other large-scale organized social actions, when confronted with racism, we can also act to make a difference as individuals or in small groups.

Do you ever wonder what happens at the monthly Summit Board Meetings? We are fortunate to have frequent representation of Summit Fellowship members at our Board Meetings. In this way the Board receives direct input regarding the needs, values, and possible solutions to concerns sought by the Fellowship. Guests at the Board Meetings are able to speak at the top of the Agenda, immediately after the check in and chalice lighting, and then leave or stay for the remainder of the meeting as they wish. We also enjoy and treasure the guests who specifically come to share inspirational words at the chalice lighting.

The Summit Board works for the well being of the Fellowship. Each month's agenda begins with the words of our Board covenant:

“Board covenant for 2015-2016: a sacred agreement.

We will follow and model the Summit Covenant of Right Relations. We will attend meetings, be on time and respect time allotments. Assuming good intentions, we will listen to each other with patience and compassion, open to diverse opinions and with permission to ask for confidentiality. We will take responsibility to ask for a process check when warranted. We will delegate and refer non-Board matters by assigning a Board member to refer an action to an individual on a committee; that action item will be reflected as “old business” on the agenda of the next meeting to ensure follow-through. Once a Board decision is made, we will speak with one voice, respecting the process that led to that decision.”

At the end of each meeting, we reflect on the following words:

“The Board adjourns in continuing spiritual community. We are committed to building a compassionate, just and sustainable world.”

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION FOR ALL

Children's Religious Exploration News

Though our Religious Exploration program is off to a great start this year, there have been a few challenges. I look at these as opportunities for growth and new understanding. Here are some of the challenges and what they are teaching us:

Spirit Play — We are the only congregation in the cluster to have a full *Spirit Play* program available for Pre-Kindergarten through 1st grade children. *Spirit Play* is a Montessori-based classroom that includes storytelling and time for children to fully connect with the story through various activities during working time. Our *Spirit Play* class has been very popular for the past four years. There have been over 40 story boxes made just for sharing in this classroom along with lots of fun and creative activities. In the past, this class was one of the biggest groups of children in the program. These children have all aged out of the class and are now in our elementary classes.

For the past month our *Spirit Play* class room has been empty, except for one visitor on one Sunday. We have a full volunteer team and are keeping the classroom ready to go with a lesson plan each week. It is our way of “hold the space” for future children. In our Covenant of Right Relations we aspire to “welcome the newcomer”. This includes 4, 5, and 6 year olds. Even though we have no children attending on a regular basis, we are ready to welcome them with open minds, loving hearts, and helping hands.

Our Community Garden – Our second and third grade group has been working hard to build and plant a real vegetable garden. We have built two 4'x4' foot beds and filled them with carefully mixed soil that will allow us to grow veggies with a minimum use of water. Once that was done, we decided to use a soaker hose irrigation system to water our plants with minimum waste. We were well on our way to growing food for all or so we thought.

After purchasing a soaker hose irrigation kit to attach to the hose, Mark Weedman customized it to fit our garden. In mid October, the first sections of the garden were planted and watered with this wonderful hose system. Last Saturday, Mark was getting ready to water the seeds and noticed that our whole soaker hose system was gone! Someone had yanked it out of the garden, leaving behind the garden hose and pins that held the system in place. This was hard to understand and the gut reaction is a feeling of violation. Mark and I can only hope that the person who thought it was necessary to take our irrigation system was in need and will use it to provide food for their family.

Now we have an opportunity to come up with a new way of irrigating the veggies. Though we have more hose, purchasing more connections and redoing the system may just be setting us up for more loss. So we'll try something else. This time we will be using a sub soil watering method by making Ollas. An Olla is an unglazed clay pot that is buried in the soil with an opening at the top. It's filled with water that will seep into the soil over a longer period than with hose

irrigation. This method has been used in other parts of the world for over 4000 years and is a very efficient method. Our Ollas were made by gluing an unglazed terracotta pot to a saucer. They will be buried in the garden beds and hopefully, will remain to provide moisture for our garden.

The disappearance of the irrigation system has provided an another opportunity to try something new. Mark and I are considering the possibility of a simple fence to deter the theft of all of our veggies when they do grow. If someone is hungry, we are glad to share, the concern is that all of the bounty will disappear at once, like our irrigation system. Again, this is an opportunity to think about how we want to be in community with our neighbors and to discover a new way to live our values of sharing while caring for all.

Invite Children and Families to Summit – Do you know any families who are looking for community? Are there children in your life who could benefit from the opportunity to explore their own sense of wonder? Extend an invitation to them to come visit Summit. Fall is the perfect time to make friends and build connections. Our program is rich and offers many opportunities for children and parents to connect that are not available in day to day life. We work to build beloved community for all ages. By sharing our treasure we create a richer program for us all.

Helping Others in East County and Beyond

Summitarians acting locally:

Hygiene packs (November's SAC collection) - hygiene packs will be "sold" on November 15th (SAC Sunday). Summitarians can "buy" (sponsor) a pack (containing toiletry items, socks, etc. and assembled by our Summit youth), and the pack will be provided to one of our Interfaith Shelter guests in December. Extra packs will be given to Crisis House for their homeless outreach program. You get to support our youth in their Social Action efforts and provide necessary supplies to our shelter guests, or to another person in East county who is currently experiencing homelessness.

Interfaith Shelter- October's SAC collection (October 18) went toward replenishing Summit's Interfaith Shelter budget which covers the costs of hosting shelter guests for two weeks this coming December. As a host site we are able to directly affect many lives in positive ways- thank you for your generosity!

Pet Food for PAWS - last month, Summit collected several barrels of pet food for PAWS, a program of the San Diego Humane Society that provides pet food, services and support, including pet food delivery, to low-income pet families who are seniors, chronically ill and disabled. Thanks for your generous donations- the food has been delivered.

4. Fill out the Registration form
5. When done, click the blue REGISTER button at bottom of form.

Your Profile Photo

You can add your photo to your profile in the Membership Directory after you have registered (once your registration has been activated). Here's how:

1. Select the photo you want to use and place it on your computer desktop.
2. Log in on www.summituuf.org and you will find yourself in the Member Area.
3. Select "Your Profile" to access the Member Profile page.
4. You'll see "Upload" under the shadow of an image. Click "Upload" to upload your photo from your desktop. **Note:** If you want to change your photo at a later date, just repeat this process with a different picture.
