### **FROM THE MINISTER'S ROLLTOP:**

#### **"Keeping Community Alive and Well"**

*"My life means nothing, either theoretically or practically, unless I am a member of a community."* - Josiah Royce (1913)

It is clear to me that what we are doing at Summit, namely, celebrating our diversity in community is an endeavor that is on the cutting edge of human evolution.

Where else but in a congregation such as ours can we find people from such different backgrounds and with such a variety of beliefs devoted to supporting one another in a common search for truth and understanding? Where else in the world are people working through differences in personality and spiritual vision, and doing their best, individually and collectively, to create the world of love and justice we all want to see?

When lived with loving intention, community becomes the indispensable incubator of our dreams, the birthing room of individual and collective purpose, the cradle of sacred, loving intention. It can enfold us with needed care. It inevitably sharpens our convictions through confrontation and the sharing of ideas. Over time, it wears us smooth and make us flexible in the course of shared trials and tragedies. It inspires joy and renews our confidence in humanity. Without community, personal and social growth becomes anemic: people forget how, or how important it is, to be compassionate. People without healthy community become ego bound, perpetuate injustice, and fail to be a part of the critical mass that will be necessary to build a more sustainable world.

Community is a spiritual practice...in community we run into the judgments we harbor toward ourselves and others. We are repeatedly reminded of how we fall short of loving ourselves and one another. We are reminded of just how much the world will need to change if anything is to get any better. In community we encounter the hopelessness within us, and sustain the hope and a vision for positive change. Without community, there is, in the end, only us lost in our individual isolation, hopelessness and helplessness. From times ancient, the saints and sages have told us:

*“Extram ecclesiam non salvus est.”* That is, "Outside the assembly of those called together, there is no health."

Let us never falter in our dedication and rededication to living together in beloved community. The future of humankind--indeed the future of all beings living in profound interconnection on this Earth--depend upon our doing so. And it starts, right here, with our fellow Summitarians!

## **FROM OUR SUMMIT LEADERSHIP**

### ***President's Report***

#### **Unitarian Universalists in the Greater Community**

I spent six days, April 11th through April 16th, 2016, in ongoing training and as a facilitator, together with a partner, of a circle group of 18 inmates at Ironwood State Prison in Blythe, California, under the auspices of the Victim Offender Education Group (VOEG) Restorative Justice Project. During my check in with the group at the first meeting, I read a poem that I had written. The men were intrigued, interested and spontaneously asked, "Can anyone write something like that?" I answered, yes, of course. At their request, writing a personal poem became their voluntary homework, no pressure. I was not sure what to expect of the men in terms of poetry, or even any reaction to this voluntary assignment as most of them are "lifers" for violent crimes. As we arrived for our April 2016 meeting, eleven men gave me their poems, a wonderful response. To choose the poem to be read out loud, all poems were turned upside down on a table. A poem was then selected by one of the men in our group. I read the following poem to them, without disclosing the name of the author.

## **POEM TO WISH**

*How I wish I could touch the green,  
Breathe the fresh, escape the cold,  
feel the sun, embrace what's warm,  
that which is love, feel its passion,  
except its pain, grow in life & enjoy the change,  
detest the loathsome act, understand the irony,  
the test of time & the point in trying me,  
the fight worth fighting, the reason for loss,  
Destiny, Determination, cost,  
the walk, the stroll, the run, the race,  
uncontrol, to control my pace.  
How I wish you could see my face,  
How I wish I could see your face,  
my wish to wish, open the cage.*

The men asked if everyone in our group could have a copy of all the poems, current and future. So, I will begin a small “pocket poetry” effort, in the prison, to share all our poems with everyone in the group. I anticipate that we might receive more poems during upcoming meetings when the men feel increasingly safer to share their emotions and thoughts. The VOEG Insight Prison Project will continue at Ironwood and other State Prisons for a total of 18 months. The men’s current official homework assignment is to write a detailed, in depth, crime impact statement, which will be read out loud at the circle, by each author. Then it will be processed with dialogue and questions from the group, under the guidance of my partner and myself as facilitators. Toward the end of the 18 months, our group will meet with victims of similar crimes, and their families, for continued, life changing dialogue. Our guiding words are, “Trust the Process, (Be the Process), for Bringing Change.”

In March, February and January 2016 the Summit Board of Directors’ work included the following topics, and more: Social Justice Ministry Signage, Risk and Liability Insurance for Summit, Leadership Development, formation of the Info Team, establishment of a Music Committee, managing the Fellowship’s growth, estimates for Sanctuary expansion, establishing a Stewardship and Fundraising program, Planned Giving committee update, Endowment Fund report, parking lot barriers, door keys, Summit as a polling place, double booking of Summit facilities, Best Food Handling Practices at the Sunday Café, Black Lives Matter Social Justice, an Informed Consent and Disclaimer process for non-sponsored activities held in our rental spaces, the Summit Buddhist Sangha is now listed in the national directory, exploring the AIM (Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry UUA) certification for Summit. Summit is a vibrant, active, welcoming community! Go, Summit!

### **Children's Religious Exploration News**

It's been an interesting spring so far and summer is just around the corner. This month, I'm sharing an update on my ankle and our plans for this summer in Children's Religious Exploration. We are also getting ready for our annual CRE retreat for our teachers, committee members and parents, focusing on visioning for the 2016-17 year. Read on for details.

On March 23<sup>rd</sup> I had surgery to repair a damaged peroneal tendon in my right ankle. The surgeon said that the tear was worse than expected and it was a really good thing that the surgery had happened when it did. For the first 30 days, I could not put weight on the ankle. I choose to purchase an amazing scooter that you may have seen on Sundays, to help me to get around. On April 23<sup>rd</sup>, I was allowed to start putting weight on the ankle, with the warning to not "overdue" it! The doc still recommends the scooter or crutches while I build strength. Each day, I'm doing simple exercises and there is more and more movement, though it feels like it's slow progress. I am still not allowed to drive so that has limited my ability to get places or to do too much. The goal is to be out of the boot and able to drive by mid June. Thank you to all who have stepped up to help, sent cards and healing my way. I am feeling blessed.

At the end of each Religious Exploration year, we have a Saturday morning/lunch retreat, to look back, evaluate and plan the upcoming year and calendar. This year it will happen on June 18th. We will explore the idea of doing an overnight retreat, but first we will send out a survey to all of

our participants to see what you want. This is very important for us to hear your ideas and need the feedback. Look for an email with details coming soon.

This summer, I am planning two fun programs for our children and youth. They are:

### **Musical Summer & Avatar – the Last Airbender**

**Musical Summer @ Summit** – For the past year, our Fellowship has been focused on building our music program. This summer members of our music community will be offering a musical experience for our children and youth. This is once again a program that we are creating in house. The goal is to explore rhythm, song, voice, music-making and even to make instruments. We are looking for volunteers who would like to share their musical skills and talents and to be part of a teaching team to work with the classes.

**Avatar, the Last Airbender** – This popular Nickelodeon cartoon has many great teachings to offer that are wrapped in Asian inspired cultures and Earth centered messages. We will journey with Aang, the last member of the Air Nation, as he explores the lands, learning from the other nations, Earth, Water and Fire, and from his traveling companions. Each week we will watch excerpts from the show and explore ideas presented. Some of Summit's young adults will help lead this program. Let me know if you would like to join the team, too!

**UU Summer Camps** – The beautiful Camp deBenneville Pines will be offering UU summer camps in July. I will be attending to co-lead the Counselor in Training and Youth Leadership Training for two weeks also in July. Many of our children and youth are planning to attend camp, too. Thanks to the Summit community we have Summit Youth Camp Scholarships to help our families be part of this beloved community in the pines. *Trump on right side of transgender issue*

I'm surprised but pleased to admit that Donald Trump has finally gotten something right: Discrimination against transgender people has no place in our national culture or laws ("Trump, Cruz find new issue to debate," April 25). The recently adopted restroom law in North Carolina is wrong and so is Ted Cruz. Sen. Cruz peddles fear and ignorance when he confuses transgender issues with sexual predatory behavior. Laws protecting children from predators are already in place. The transgender restroom law does nothing to protect children from adult predators. The law is an example of the rehashed 1980s-era conservative culture war politics. It is as hateful and indefensible as ever. Mr. Cruz and those who support the law invalidate the dignity and worth of people everywhere who are living the truth of who they are. Transgendered folk are not

a threat to our children, and some of our children will one day rely on the life examples of transgendered people as role models.
