WE THE PEOPLE OF THE WORLD. . . .

Call for Moral Leadership

The declining quality and value of life on our planet have moved us to rise up and confront ourselves and our leadership with a call to conscious action.

Our leaders have been unable to prevent or stop the many forms of personal, social and environmental degradation that now afflict the Earth.

Inasmuch as we have failed to insist that they help us effectively address these problems, we the people of the world share responsibility for the current conditions that threaten the life, liberty and pursuit of happiness of all.

We refuse to accept this state of affairs any longer. To ourselves and our leaders we say: to support anything less than the commitments outlined in this declaration is inhumane, spiritually unenlightened and morally indefensible.

We the people of the world urge all leaders in government, politics, business, the sciences and technology, academics, healthcare, human services, religion and the arts to work together with us voluntarily and in good faith, to form a human society wherein the following are regarded as the fundamental rights and essential prerequisites of true democracy:

- No one goes hungry, thirsty or without adequate shelter.
- The best in modern healthcare is available to everyone.
- All are protected from physical and psychological violence.
- Each is granted as much education as they are able and willing to achieve, in service to the development of a free and just society.
- Every person is guaranteed opportunities for work at a living wage.
- Children will inherit a clean environment and a sustainable future.
- Each is encouraged and enabled to determine the course of their own life, reproduction, fulfillment and death, provided the basic rights of others are upheld and defended.

Such moral and spiritual commitments by us and our leaders are the hallmarks of an enlightened and healthy society. In their universal establishment we will take an important step toward overcoming the regressive political, social and economic agendas that threaten our planet and its future generations.

Children's Religious Exploration News

Our Religious Exploration year is coming to an end and it has been an exciting one! I want to share what has been going on with each age group. And our CRE retreat and lunch is coming up, when we will review the past year and plan the upcoming year. All are welcome to be part of creating an awesome program for next year. We have an exciting summer filled with music and fandom fun planned, too. Here is what we have been up to all year long and a peek at what is coming up next:

Religious Exploration 2015-16

Our Nursery is filled with laughter as we now have several families with young children who are attending regularly. Cathy Young is our Professional Nursery Caregiver and does a wonderful job. She brings early childhood education and special needs training to our program. We also have a dedicated group of volunteers who help in the Nursery each week,

providing a caring, loving place for our babies, young children and their parents.

We also have several children in our Prekindergarten through First grade class. This is a Montessori-based, *Spirit Play* program, that focuses on the basic UU Principles as simple ideas and values that are called “promises.” Each week we address one of the promises using a story to illustrate the principles. The stories are told using a story box filled with objects, many of them handmade, to illustrate the tale. After the story, children are allowed to explore it further through crafts or activities picked especially for that story or to use any of the materials or other stories to create their own spiritual expression. It is this time that is so valuable for the children. They have their own space to explore what we’ve talked about, or be in community with one another, according to their needs. There aren’t many places where children of this age can have a place to truly explore. We have a wonderful group of dedicated teachers for this group, who “held the space” at the beginning of the year when our enrollment was very low for this class. I am so grateful for their faith that we would have children back and now we do! We will continue to offer *Spirit Play* next year so let your friends with young children know that we have a place where they can develop and grow here at Summit.

Have you visited the Summit CRE vegetable garden or tasted some of the wonderful bounty? Our Second and Third grade class has been gardening all year long as well as exploring their curriculum. This year they used the “*Love Will Guide Us*” program to learn about the sources that Unitarian Universalists draw from to examine our spiritual connection to each other and our faith. They discovered that there is a common language between many sources and faith expressions. Love is the common language or the “Golden Rule.” All year they have been searching for ways to express love in community, while gardening and growing food to share with each other, the Fellowship, and anyone who walks by. The garden will continue to be part of our program as it connects us to our planet Earth and to feeding our bodies in a healthy, loving way.

The Fourth and Fifth grade class started the year exploring tools for life in “*Tool Box of Faith*.” In this curriculum, tools were used as metaphors for ideas that we can use to make the world a better place. They used a ruler to create a covenant together, a magnifying glass to ask questions, a hammer to wield power in a just way, and so much more. This curriculum explores contributions others have made to create positive change in the world. Upon completion of their own Tool Boxes, they started a project to be their own change makers. Using digital animation and Lego’s, the group has created an short animated story with justice as the moral. This will be shared at our Religious Exploration service on June 12th.

This year our Middle School youth have been on an Epic QUUest! They have been exploring beliefs and world religions each week so they can build their understanding and to discover grains of personal truth. As part of this journey, they have had guest speakers from various

faith traditions and have been on field trips to experience other faith communities first hand. The group visited the Islamic Center of San Diego where they met with middle school aged Muslim youth and the Imam (preacher/reverend). They had the opportunity to hear the call to and to witness the afternoon prayer. They also visited the Hsi Fang Temple of the San Diego Buddhist Association. They listened to a presentation from a Buddhist Nun, toured the temple, experienced meditation and counted all of the Buddha's and bodhisattvas in the temple (there were over 1000!). They will share some of their discoveries during the service on June 12th.

The High School Youth Group is small but mighty this time around. Instead of a curriculum, they have worked on various projects throughout the year. Last fall, they worked together to create the holiday play, starting with our super hero's names and logos. They worked hard to bring the play to life. The group helped to prepare CRE for the Interfaith Shelter during the Christmas holidays, including taking the lead on making hygiene packs and fleece blankets. They created two very special Auction experiences for Summitarians: Star Wars Movie Night and Social Media with a Digital Native. This past spring, they created a wonderful service for the congregation entitled, *"Passion and Principles."* Plus, they helped to promote and prepare two camp fundraising lunches. They do all of their projects and while having fUUn! (That's how we spell it in UU youth land.) This group steps up to serve in many ways at Summit and in the broader UU community. They volunteer in the nursery, help in the classrooms on Sundays, help at the Auction, volunteer during the week helping Mark with the grounds, and serve in other leadership roles here, at Camp and in the PSWD. This group lives "Service is our Prayer."

All of the activities and classes above are only possible because we have amazing volunteers in our CRE program. Our volunteers partner with our children and youth to explore, learn and discover, a deeper understanding and spiritual connection in community together. This is one of the reasons that our program is called "Religious Exploration" rather than education. We explore! We discover! We create community together while learning about ourselves as individuals. Our teaching volunteers experience this first hand. There are good days and challenging ones, lessons that are engaging and ones that, no matter how well planned, just are not working. Each week is an adventure and always offers opportunities for growth. It is working in covenant together with children and youth that makes being a part of our program such a valuable experience. Each and every volunteer is so appreciated for the gift of their time and unique talents to our children and youth. Together we are creating beloved community for all at Summit.

6th Annual CRE Retreat - Saturday, June 18th – 9:00 am to 3:00 pm @ Summit

At the end of each Children's Religious Exploration year, we have a Saturday morning and lunch retreat for all parents, teachers and committee members to look back, evaluate and plan

the upcoming year and calendar. We are meeting in the Salon for a homemade breakfast and lunch to enjoy while working together to make next year a special one for all.

Summer Programs for 2016

Musical Summer @ Summit – For the past year, our Fellowship has been focused on building our music program. This summer we'll be working with members of our music community to offer a musical experience to our children and youth. This is once again a program that we are creating in house. There will be three areas of focus: Rhythm, Instruments (including making your own), and Singing! We will finish the summer with a musical "Jam Session" and hope to share some of our creations at the Ingathering Service in September. Come be part of the fun! We are looking for volunteers to share musical skills and talents, and a teaching team to work with the classes. (Musical talents are not required to teach.)

Avatar, the Last Airbender - This popular Nickelodeon cartoon has many great teachings to offer that are wrapped in Asian inspired cultures and Earth centered messages. We will journey with Aang, the last member of the Air Nation, and from his traveling companions, as they explore the lands, learning from the other nations; Earth, Water and Fire. Each week we will watch excerpts from the show and explore the concepts presented. Some of Summit's young adults will be helping to lead this program. Book Club

The Summit UU Book Club will meet Tuesday evening, June 7th, at 7:00pm in the Summit Library to discuss the novel "*All The Light We Cannot See*" by Anthony Doerr, winner of the 2015 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction.

This story is a beautiful, stunningly ambitious instant bestseller about a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths collide in occupied France as both try to survive the devastation of World War II. Strictly speaking, this is not a "war novel"; the author's focus is on the interior lives of his two characters. Marie Laure and her father flee to the countryside of Nazi-occupied France. Afterward, her father disappears. She meets Werner, a gadget-obsessed German orphan whose skills admit him to a brutal branch of the Hitler Youth. The lives of the two young people are then forever profoundly changed.

3. Select "Your Profile" to access the Member Profile page.
4. You'll see "Upload" under the shadow of an image. Click "Upload" to upload your photo from your desktop. **Note:** If you want to change your photo at a later date, just repeat this process with a different picture.
