Theme: Resistance

April 2 "Hard to Resist" Prof. Mark Wheeler, Guest Speaker

The Tao teaches us to follow the path of least resistance: Go with the flow! Yet Love requires that we take a stand and resist hatred, oppression and injustice: Fight the good fight! How can these conflicting commands both be true?

Mark is a member of Summit, a professor of philosophy at SDSU, serves as president for the nonprofit Compassion for African Villages, and also teaches kung-fu and tai-chi.

April 9

"Resistance, Rebirth, Renewal: Hidden Messages of Spring" Rev. Tania Márquez , Guest Minister

Look around for signs of spring, Summitarians, and search your garden, your neighborhood, your local store for flowers to bring to our **Flower Communion Ritual** on Easter Sunday April 9th.

Rev. Tania Marquez will be speaking at our pulpit and reflecting on Renewal as a form of Resistance by touching on Jesus's story and his show of resistance in the week before Easter. We will be celebrating the miracle of spring and its message of rebirth with a Flower Communion. Our RE children will help us tell this story and participate in this ritual with a unique inter-generational service.

April 16 "How to Survive the End of the World " Rev. Dr. Don Stouder, Guest Minister

The era of COVID 19 changed everyone and everything. Climate Change has been shown to be far more imminent in it's danger than we first



realized. In this sermon, Rev. Don will reflect on ways to build our resistance to panic, as well as ways to build resilience for the long haul. Doom and gloom cannot be our new normal. We have to learn how to build a better world, even as we learn how to survive in this one.

Rev. Don has served as an Affiliate Community Minister of Summit since 1996, is currently living and working in Palm Springs, working with hospice patients and their families, and has served in a variety of capacities at the UU Church of the Desert.

April 23 "Life Hacks from the Buddha" Rev. Arvid Straube, Guest Minister

One doesn't have to become a Buddhist to benefit from some of the Buddha's teachings. Rev. Arvid, who has had a Buddhist practice for more than 40 years will share some of the teachings that help make life better.

April 30 "What Does it Mean to Respectfully Resist?" Gregg Ward, Guest Speaker

The data couldn't be more clear: according to a significant amount of research, we are living in a time of rampant public disrespect. A recent survey found that ³/₄ of all front-line workers in 25 industries across the globe have experienced disrespect and incivility by customers on an average of once a month. Even more chilling, 73% assume this is normal. Gregg Ward, the bestselling, award-winning author, and speaker on leadership helps us make sense of this disturbing trend and provides thoughtful, practical insight as to how we can respectfully resist becoming a statistic ourselves.

MARY CARTER-VAIL, DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

We resist with love as our guide.

Resistance: Some of my earliest memories

are of resistance. I remember sitting on my father's shoulders and singing "The Hammer Song" at protest marches in 1960's. (If I had a Hammer by UU Pete Seeger and Lee Hays) My parents were actively involved in the Civil Rights movement, women's liberation, and anti-war activism when I was a child in New York City. We were resisting a cultural status quo that was, in my child-mind, unfair and unequitable. I grew up to protest proliferation of nuclear weapons in my teens and to work for LGBTQ rights in my 20s during the AIDS epidemic. It seemed like there was always a place where we had to be ready to resist injustice and support the rights of people over profit and power. I was hoping that we would, at some point move past the need to resist as if our lives depended on it. It was not to be so. We continue to resist as laws are passed to legislate how we are able to access care for our bodies and the bodies of our children ... books are being banned ... Drag Queen Story Hour is attacked ... the lives of Trans people are actively being harmed by hateful politics. Weapons of mass harm have more rights than our children do to gather in safety. I cannot wrap my mind around it. Resistance is what I am called to do each day, yet there are so many areas of harm that I do not even know where to start.

I pause and take a breath. Breathe deeply, hold and release. I go outside and put my bare feet on the ground and feel the dirt in my toes and feel restored. My breath returns for the next story, the next song. Love and resistance are what I center in my heart at this challenging time. My childhood memory of singing The Hammer Song seems like such a long time ago and yet, we are still singing protest songs, as children ride on their parents' shoulders once again, resisting as people in power are working to restrict our hard fought for basic human rights. May we continue to sing our songs as we resist with love.

Mary's Surgery: My hip replacement surgery on April 3rd. This will be the first of two hip replacement surgeries. The second will be late summer/early fall depending on how this one goes. I will be on medical leave for most of April while I heal and rebuild my strength so that I can return to my full self.

April CRE: Our Children's program will continue while Mary is gone. April 9th, Mary's first Sunday away will be Easter and all ages will be together in the service. For the three remaining Sundays, our families are leading the lessons and activities. Nick Orr will be helping our families in RE for each of these Sunday's. Check out the planned activities below. We even are planning on a very special visit from John, "The Rock Guy", Sapp! The Nursery will be open for all five weeks in April, even during the Interfaith Shelter.

Our April Theme is Resistance.

We will be gathering in RE at 10 am on Sundays for Religious Exploration on Sundays for our activities. Our children and youth will participate in the service until after the "Time for All Ages" story. We will then engage in our activities in the Religious Exploration area and/ or outside (depending on weather conditions). We have a special snack provided by one of our families after our exploration time that we share outside under the shade canopy until we are finished at 11:30 am. April 3 – Resisting with Breathing, Wax Resist Egg Art & <u>SPRING EGG HUNT!</u> – We begin by learning that our breath has power when we are facing difficult times and our anger is stirred. We will practice some breathing to calm the body and then move into using a wax resist method to make spring eggs. Mary



will share the art of Pysanki, as we use wax and beautiful colors to create eggs in the tradition of the Ukrainian people. This will be Mary's last Sunday before her surgery.

April 9 - Easter Sunday Flower Communion

Service – All ages are invited to join in for our annual Full Fellowship Service to celebrate and welcome the Spring with stories of resistance. Bring a bloom for each member of your family

to share for the flower communion ceremony and learn the story behind this beautiful ritual.



April 16 – Resisting by Joining Together – At this time of Passover we will be sharing a story of resistance from a small Danish village that worked together to help Jewish people hide and find safe passage during World War 2. After the story, children will use Legos to build cooperatively as they explore aspects of the story. The Lindham family will be leading this Sunday.

April 23 – Resisting by Changing Our Habits: Honoring Earth Day – This week we explore how we resist being complacent by changing our habits. The holiday of Earth Day is a perfect time to explore this, as we learn and relearn the habit of living gently and simply on the earth. We will play in the garden and get creative with ways to reduce our impact on our living planet. The Martinez family will be leading this Sunday.

April 30 – Resisting like a Rock – This week we will have a special visit from "The Rock Guy", John Sapp. Some of our RE children attended John's Auction event and came back with wonderful stories and great rock enthusiasm that was contagious! Rocks are wonderful models of resistance be they Igneous, Sedimentary or Metamorphic. John will be sharing his passion with our families as we finish our month by rocking out! The Brown Family will be leading this Sunday.

Message from the President of the Board



Dear Summitarians and Friends,

This past year has seen some changes in our Sunday Morning programming and support. With no minister, the members of the Sunday Services Committee have been doing a herculean job of booking speakers, finding readings, coordinating with musicians and DRE, and preparing the Order of Service *every week*, plus serving as Service Associates on Sundays. I love seeing new people join this group! This past month the Board created the contract position of Sunday Service Coordinator, which is paid a small stipend to wrangle cats. Seraphina Galante is our new Coordinator, working with Sunday Service Chair, Carol Schnaubelt, and the rest of the team. The Sunday Service Coordinator position will continue until we have a new minister in place, who will then be responsible for planning most Sundays. This position is being paid out of the Social Media Grant.

We have also started paying the Zoom Manager, who schedules all zoom meetings for the congregation, uploads Sunday Services to YouTube, and coordinates the Zoom Techs each Sunday. The Board felt that since our multi-platform services are important to our long-distance community, and since such specialized training is needed for this, both the Zoom Manager and Zoom Techs would also receive a stipend. Ryn Corbeil is our Zoom Manager. We have a few Zoom Tech folks trained who work during the serivces. If you are tech-savvy, and would like to learn how to help with this, please contact Ryn! For the remainder of this year, grant funds are also paying for these positions. They will become line items in next year's budget.



If you have not yet filled out your pledge form for next year, please do so as soon as possible! The budget we vote on in June is based on the amount that members and friends have pledged to our Fellowship for the next fiscal year (July 1 thru June 30). With all that has been happening this year, I have not had a chance to pursue the Social Media effort as I would have liked. I look forward to working on that starting in July. 
SOCIAL JUSTICE IN ACTION

A Conversation About the Proposed Changes to the UUA Principles and Purposes

Sunday, April 23rd at 12 noon, in the Summit Library

Have you heard about the Article II Report and changes proposed to the UU Principles? They will be voted on at the General Assembly in June. Article II of the UUA Bylaws, Principles and Purposes is the foundation of our shared values and the covenant to which all UU congregations and communities agree to as members of the UUA. The last substantial changes to these principles were made in 1985.

The Article II Study Commission recently came out with a report proposing significant changes to how these shared values are expressed; transforming the seven UU principles into a new set of core values (as described on page 9 of this newsletter). Your views are important to helping Summit's delegates understand and share the views of our congregation on these proposed changes. Summit's Welcoming and Membership Committee is hosting a discussion of the proposed changes in order to inform members of Summit AND to get your views.


Article II Commission has been assigned the task of re-evaluating and re-forming our guiding principles. Here is their draft—in a nutshell. It will be voted on at General Assembly, in June. Image Description: This image is of a chalice with and overlay of the word love over the flame, with six outstretched arms that create a circle around each of the core values and form a sixpetal flower shape. Each arm is a different color and clockwise they are: Interdependence (Orange), Equity (Red), Transformation (Purple), Pluralism (Dark Blue), Generosity (Teal), and Justice (Yellow).

Interdependence. We honor the interdependent web of all existence. We covenant to cherish Earth and all beings by creating and nurturing relationships of care and respect. With humility and reverence, we acknowledge our place in the great web of life, and we work to repair harm and damaged relationships.

Pluralism. We celebrate that we are all sacred beings diverse in culture, experience, and theology. We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and meaning. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.

Justice. We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive. We covenant to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic





oppression. We support the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions.

Transformation. We adapt to the changing world. We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Openness to change is fundamental to our Unitarian and Universalist heritages, never complete and never perfect.

Generosity. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope. We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.

Equity. We declare that every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and worthiness. We covenant to use our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain fully accessible and inclusive communities.
