RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION NEWS—FOR ALL AGES

MARY CARTER-VAIL, DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

I am home after a month of back-and-forth travel from Summit to Camp DeBenneville Pines. July was a VERY busy month! We had children go to

sleep over camp for their first time and some of our young adults served as program staff for both Elementary and Sr High Camp. We also launched our first post-pandemic Our Whole Lives program. For me, it finally felt like a normal summer. It felt like home.

Home: Our theme for August is an invitation for each of us to explore the theme of Home. In our RE program, our children and families create home thru the connections they make with each other as they explore, play and create together. This month we will be exploring home in Religious Exploration with activities to connect us as a community that can bring in all ages. We will start by sharing the Arcade that our children have been working on in July and then have some special Sundays planned as we celebrate the theme of Home: Back to School Blessings Sunday, Tie Dye Sunday, & Creating Our Home Sunday. Our Whole Lives is Back at Summit: For the first time since the shutdown, we are once again teaching in-person OWL classes. Our Whole Lives is a comprehensive, age-appropriate, sexuality education program for all ages. We have started the early elementary program for our Kinder to 1st grade children, with 5 families enrolled. This class centers on healthy body image, boundaries, consent and learning about babies and birth. We have a "Dream Team" of volunteers partnering with me to lead the classes and I am so glad that our children and getting this experience. We have plans to offer the upper elementary program winter/spring and will be working on scheduling additional levels based on congregational interest. Let me know what you are interested in, and I can begin the advanced planning to make it happen. OWL levels include: Jr & Sr High, Young Adult,

I am home after a month Adult, & Sr or Golden OWL.

Lessons from Sr High Camp - Rebirth of Youth **Leadership:** The last week in July I was at Camp as part of the Sr High "Dean Team". I feel called to share a bit of my experience with the congregation as it is something that we can all draw strength and wisdom from. First, some background. At Summer Camp 2019, we had 120 registered campers, with 30+ on a wait list. The staff was led by two youth deans in partnership with adult deans. The youth deans lead the youth staff, and they were in charge of all programing while the adult staff help the safety container and supported their work. Youth in these leadership positions had been mentored for up to 8 camps prior through the Chrysalis leadership training program, (I was a leader in this program), or by being an understudy on the prior camp's staff. There was a leadership pipeline for youth where they learned the skills needed to run the camp for their peers. It was a youth lead camp and one of the only youth lead UU camps in the country that I know of. The shutdown crumbled the foundation of our youth lead camps. Last Summer we tried to have our first youth in-person camp and a COVID outbreak post-GA took out our adult staff pool and some youth leaders so, after much scrambling, we had a four-day mini-camp with one youth leader and much adult support. Winter Camp was all adult led, I was Dean, with an invitation for any youth to take on a piece at the camp so they could begin to learn how to make camp happen. We had a big leadership conversation and asked the youth community what they wanted and supported the revision of what our youth camps could be going forward. (We did not want to assume that they wanted to take the lead again after the past pandemic years.) The youth community at camp decided that they DID want the challenge of running this camp, summer 2023, themselves. They called it Camp ForwUUrd. The idea being to bring forward the things that were loved about youth lead camps while creating what is next together.

Camp ForwUUrd: Two High School seniors were chosen as Youth Deans, by their peers to lead this first fully youth-lead camp at that meeting last winter. They partnered with the two Adult Deans, me, and Patti, who had been a youth dean and is now a professional coach. We have been working with them all spring to plan and it was hard to get them to focus on the work in advance of the camp, even with much guidance that this would help to ease the camp experience for them. (There is a gentle dance of coaching, teaching, mentoring, and guiding new leaders as they discover their ability to lead and finally gain confidence in their skills and the trust of the community.) At the beginning of the week there was tension as we had to balance the needs of the camp safety container, rules, etc., with the desire of the youth leaders to do the fun stuff and leave the challenging decisions to the adults. We held them to the vision of youth lead camp as they leaned into the tension, stumbling a bit to find their way through schedule changes, programing challenges and curfew checkin process problems. Mid-week the youth Deans said they wanted a youth-only staff meeting without adults. Patti and I said to go for it. The Youth Staff felt we were trying to control them and what we were really doing was working to get them to take control and own their camp. At the next all-staff meeting, with youth and adults, the Youth Deans said they were promised an All Youth-Led Camp and that they wanted adults to let them lead! They thought that they were challenging the adults - Patti had tears in their eyes, and I was beaming with pride as I said, "We have been waiting for this!" There was a huge release of tension from the youth as they realized that they had our complete trust in creating the camp they wanted – they had always had it – we just had to work together. From that point on, they led on every decision with confidence, asking questions when they wondered about options, and checking in with us on anything big. It was AMAIZING to see them finally own their camp experience once again. They rebuilt their home, and it was beautiful.

Why do I share this long story? It is the story of leadership in covenantal community spaces. I sometimes feel this tension here at Summit as well.

We had a similar experience in Religious Exploration as we created our Family Service last May on a much smaller level. Now, it is time to lean into creating our new Religious Exploration program for the Fall and that starts with gathering a group together who, like the youth leaders at camp, are willing to play together to create what is next. I am ready to partner with you. This process can be the most rewarding experience for all who participate as we come together to create a vision and bring it to life. Who wants to come play, create and rebuild our spiritual home with me? Let us look forward together and rebuild our home.

Our August Theme is Home.

We will be gathering in RE at 10 am on Sundays for Religious Exploration on Sundays for our activities. Our children and youth will participate in the service until after the "Time for All Ages" story. We will then engage in our activities in the Religious Exploration area and/or outside (depending on weather conditions). We have a special snack provided by one of our families after our exploration time that we share outside under the shade canopy until we are finished at 11:30 am.

August 6 – Collaborative Cardboard Creations
Arcade Party – This will be our final day to finish and share our Collaborative Cardboard Creations!
We will be testing out our games, adjusting as needed and getting to play them. We will set them all up in the RE area and invite the congregation to come visit after the service and play the games. Come join in the fun.

August 13 – Back to School Blessings Sunday – As many of you are getting ready to go back to school, we will take the time to celebrate the transition to a new year. We will make charms to hang on your book bags, water bottles or lunch bags and then create our own blessing ritual together so that each child or youth is ready for the new school year with "positive vibes".

August 20 – Tie Dye Sunday – This Sunday is time to bring your cotton items to dye. T-shirts, socks, skirts, pants, scarves, and dresses, we have done them all. Bring something that is cotton or mostly

cotton to tie dye this Sunday. We will be getting a Children's Religious Exploration Email. To receive bit messy so wear clothing that can get messy. Mary will have dyes and screens ready to go. We will be working outside so bring water bottles to stay hydrated.

August 27 – Creating Our Home Sunday – Let's Get Creative with our Religious Exploration Spaces and make some art for the walls, decorate the rooms, maybe even rearrange the furniture with some adult help. This is our space and this Sunday we will be "feathering the nest" as we make it our home to get ready for fall classes to start in September.

These are the plans at the beginning of the month, and they may be adapted as our community's needs adapt so, please watch the weekly


