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RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION/FAITH FORMATION NEWS Mary Carter-Vail, Director of Religious Exploration

October is usually a month of falling leaves and memories of loved ones as we enter spooky season. Summit feels like it is beginning to expand as we welcomed our new

minister KC Pandell with joy and excitement. My heart is heavy this year for personal reasons. It is the feeling of "both and" at the same time. Both Sadness and Excitement. Both anticipation of Halloween fun with treats & costumes and the memories of loved ones who have passed beyond the veil. Let us experience all the complexity together.

The Gift of Heritage: This October we are going to explore the Gifts of Heritage. Each week's exploration will be about what it means to understand our heritage as we will be using the roots of a tree as a metaphor for what holds us. This is a way for our children to understand how the past heritage (roots) supports the tree that we are growing now. We will be exploring how we stay close to our roots by learning about our past and reclaiming our roots as we learn the stories of our ancestors. We will learn reclaiming our roots by learning stories from the Kumeyaay for Indigenous Peoples Day and stories of the LGBTQ+ community for LGBTQ+ History Month. And we will continue to be rooted in science and reason as an import piece of our heritage. Finally, we will be honoring our pagan roots as we take time to remember the gifts of our ancestors through grieving our roots around Samhain. Join us as we dig deep to discover our roots and the gifts of heritage together.

Soul Work: Last month during the Water Communion service we had our first ever "Splash Zone". I created a special pool of water with sand, smooth rocks, pebbles, shells, and shiny jewels for our young and young at heart congregants to explore in a "silent meditation" during the full fellowship service. This is an example of embodied worship or soul work. The goal being that worship at Summit be accessible to all ages and all the variety of ways that people engage with spiritual practice. This month we will have a Heritage Tree in the sanctuary that all ages can engage with. When you attend in person, you will be able to add to the tree as part of a month-long group project. For folks who are joining us online, we will be including the tree in our visuals so that you can witness the process as it unfolds. An Update from Mary: I am deeply grieving the loss of my life partner Paul. I have written some of the story of what happened during the last two weeks of his life that is available in this newsletter (with a trigger warning) if you are interested. His journey is done and mine is just beginning. My intention is to be open and honest about what I am experiencing while being sensitive to the needs of the community. I hope that I am finding that balance as this is all new to me. I have a huge amount of work to do in unwinding his business as I close it down. Paul was one of the only independent Saab mechanics in the county. (According to his customers, one of the best in the country.) This includes figuring out in process work, plus selling, returning, and junking over 100 Saabs. (I kid you not.) I am getting lots of help from family and many Summit members and friends and am so incredibly grateful for each person's contribution big and small. So many have asked how to help, and I don't always know exactly what I need at the moment. I DO need help at Summit with the Childrens RE program. I DO need help at the ranch with cleaning up all of the car mess and landscaping mess on the property. I DO need people to listen and hold my hand as I find a new way of being in the world. And, on top of all of that... my next hip surgery is October 23rd.... So Help is definitely needed with any type of Halloween activity at Summit this year.

Faith Formation Volunteers STILL Needed: We continue to need volunteers who will be Faith Formation Leaders that guide our children and youth as they explore throughout the year. Each group needs two leaders on a Sunday to support them with a story and activities that Mary will prepare in advance. Currently, we still need more volunteers so that folks will only need to help one Sunday a month. All our parents volunteer as well as many young adults who grew up at Summit. It is special when we have adults who are not parents of children in the program share their time with our kids. In the past, we have had up to 45 volunteers each month with ages ranging from 18 to 98! All that has changed since the pandemic, and we are currently rebuilding the program. Please consider being part of this important part of our congregational life. (Volunteers who work with children will need to be background checked and take a Mandated Reporter training.) Our October Theme is The Gift of Heritage.

We will be gathering in RE at 10 am on Sundays for Religious Exploration on Sundays for our activities. Our children and youth will participate in the service until after the "Time for All Ages" story. We will then split into age centered groups to engage in our activities in the Religious Exploration area and/or outside (depending on weather conditions). After the service, we will be joining our families in the Salon for sustenance & community social time. Nursery childcare will be available until 12 noon.

October 1 – The Gifts of Staying Close to Our Roots – As we start to learn about Heritage, we will be exploring our roots through art and games including the tangled root game.

October 8 – The Gift of Reclaiming Our Roots – In honor of Indigenous Peoples Day we will be learning about the Kumeyaay people through stories and games.

October 15 – The Gifts of Our LGBTQ+ Roots – We will be learning about famous people from the LGBTQ+ community and the contributions that they have made to popular culture and more through games and activities.

October 22 – The Gifts of Being Rooted in Science and Reason – This will be a fun science Sunday that will include the mentos in soda experiment in the parking lot! October 29 – The Gifts of Honoring & Grieving Our Roots – All month long we will be working on our memory tree in the sanctuary. This Sunday we will have some time to honor our loved ones. We may have some fun Halloween activities as well depending on what our parents choose to organize. (Mary will be out healing from her second hip surgery this week and the next.)

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A Personal Story of Paul's Last Weeks from Mary (Trigger Warning: Medical Trauma, Stroke, Death)

This past month has been one of the absolute hardest of my life. On September 5th, I held the hand of my life partner, Paul, as he breathed his last breath. We were surrounded by our three children, Sean, Anya & Colin, Paul's sister, Louise and our bonus children, Lorena & Isaac. Paul, who was only 61, had had a large stroke caused by clots that had formed on a failing artificial aortic valve that he was in the hospital to repair. He had been born with a congenital birth defect that had required the original valve to be replaced at age 50.

Paul was admitted to the hospital on August 23rd when the valve's condition was discovered, and they began preparing for the surgery early the following week. The doctors had to research the prior valve, get measurements and more before slipping in the new one laparoscopically while his heart would not miss a beat. That was the plan. The risk, the doctors said, was blood clots and stroke. August 24th was our 38th wedding anniversary and we celebrated in his hospital room with an orchid and box salad from TJ's. Paul was very nervous about the procedure, so I asked Rev. Tania, who was part of the Chaplain team at Sharp Memorial, to visit him. They had a long conversation about Paul's condition, concerns and wishes that would offer me some comfort later.

On the morning of Saturday, August 26, I arrived at Paul's room after going home to feed the critters & check on his butterfly garden & hummingbirds. A few minutes after I arrived, he suddenly started slurring his words and smiling funny – symptoms I immediately recognized as a stroke. So I called for help. Everything became a blur as a code was called and he was rushed off for immediate surgery to remove the clots from his brain. I was ushered up to the ICU where I sat shaking and stunned wondering what happened.

The next 11 days were the worst of my life as each day he slipped further and further away from us. All the kids and his sister came to be with him at some point during the week along with several dear friends who would sit with me at the hardest time of my life. There was a moment of hope when for a brief time he came off the vent and could speak to me. He said, "I love you" and "Where are my kids?" He got to hug his oldest during that brief time before his airway began to collapse and the vent had to go back in. For 5 days I did not leave his side except to use the facilities or to talk to the doctors. I held his hand and whispered to him. I told him stories of what our children were doing, of our hopes and dreams, of future trips that we had been planning, of anything that I could think of to bring him back. Mostly I told him that I loved him and that I was glad that we had been together for 40 years.

On Friday, September 2, our family met with his medical team of doctors, nurses, specialists, and Rev Tania as Chaplain, who were all trying to find some way to save him. They all, one by one, told me that the heart was too weak, the stroke was too big, and the clots were too many. I looked for some hope and there was none. We were all devastated, including the medical team. A few days later, the stroke took his brain stem, and he was gone. As I held his hand for the final hours of his life as I told him that I loved him, I forgave him and that the kids and I would be ok. I said that he was going on the ultimate road trip and that I would join him when it was my turn. I told him that I would see him in his gardens and in the monarchs and hummingbirds that he carefully created spaces for and that he could create a new garden for us to be in together on our next adventure.

On Sunday, Sept. 24th, the W&MC hosted "Get to Know Us", an orientation for newcomers. We were very pleased that nine new folks joined us for lunch. Along with lunch several of us spoke. Our new minister, KC, explained how the UUA supports the 1000s of congregations nationally. Pam Williams, Coit was founded in September 1988 until the present with our welcoming our new minister. She talked about the early struggles holding services in the Masonic Lodge in San Carlos, to our recent challenges with COVID, and last year being totally lay lead. She felt stronger community bonds developed for those of us who helped meet the challenges both in our early time and more recently. 
